MISSING BANKER MAY COME BACK

After Seventeen Years of Exile Man Whose Banks Failed Has Paid Back Every Cent—Can Now Come Home.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 1.—J. K. Edmiston, president of the Walla Walla Savings bank of Walla Walla and head of the old Security Savings bank of Seattle, when those institutions closed their doors in 1893, may now return to Washington after 17 years of exile.

Because Edmiston has paid back every cent due those who lost by the bank failures, he has earned a pardon, and Governor Hay has just granted it, although Edmiston has not served the two years' penitentiary sentence pronounced upon him.

The whereabouts of the fugitive banker is not known to his attorneys, who have acted as his agents in settling his debts.

Some say he is in Egypt, others think he is in Central or Southern America.

A short time previous to his disappearance Edmiston said that it would do neither the state, himself or his creditors any good to lock him up. Then he turned over his property to his creditors and disappeared.

Since then he paid paid his debts a little at a time and now his account is squared with the state and his creditors.

BOXERS START THE TRAINING "STUNTS"

Fighting Dick Wheeler, who will box ten rounds with Frankie Edwards at the Medford opera house next Tuesday evening, was formerly a sparring partner to Battling Nelson and is said to be one of the most promising lightweights on the Pacific coast. He has a number of ring victories already to his credit, having secured decisions over such men as Johnnie Frayne and Johnnie Foley, the Canadian.

Both he and Edwards, who will be his opponent in the main event of the evening, have already started working out and beginning this morning commenced their road work.

Edwards, who is now engaged in the plumbing business in this city, has had considerable ring experience in California and is conceded to be one of the most scientific of the lightweight boxers.

TO CONSOLIDATE PHONE SYSTEMS

Morgan Engineering Great Financial Deal—Independent Concern and Bell Interests are to be Brought Under One Head.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—The proposed consolidation of the Bell and independent telephone systems which is being engineered by J. P. Morgan, may not be consummated unless he gives the independents a square deal, according to Frank Woods, president of the independent companies. Woods has been in conference with P. H. Davidson, Morgan's representative, and President Vail of the American Telephone and Telegraph company, the parent company of the Bell interests. Wood said the independents would fight the merger unless it were completed on an equitable basis.

The committee appointed by the National Independent association expects to report to the independent convention in Chicago during the month.

"Of course we want to do something to stop ruinous competition and rate-slashing," said Woods. "The Bell companies are better able to continue these tactics than we are because they are great strongholds and they can make rates at their pleasure, earning the money used in rate cutting elsewhere. But we do not propose to let the canary bird to the Bell interests' cat. Morgan must show us that our lines and our subscribers will be as well treated as the Bell stockholders and subscribers."

TO CREATE FUND TO BOOST STATE

State May Give \$20,000 to Carry on Publicity Work in Oregon—Follows Consultation With Louis W. Hill of Railroad Fame.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 1.—Corresponding with the suggestions made before the joint assembly of the Oregon legislature by Louis W. Hill of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroad systems yesterday at noon, Representatives James D. Abbott of Multnomah county will today introduce a bill in the house appropriating \$20,000 for advertising and procuring desirable farming districts for the state of Oregon. A state immigration agent is to be created who is to serve without compensation to collect statistical information regarding the state's resources, industries, products and physical characteristics.

The state immigration agent is to co-operate with the Oregon Development league and the Oregon agricultural college and also is to communicate with the commissioner general of the immigration of the federal government regarding the disposal and handling of desirable prospective citizens. The immigrant agent is to be appointed by the governor and
