### BANK GROWS 143 PER CENT IN YEAR

Bank of Jacksonville Has Made Great Strides in Year and Testifies to Great Growth in City—Much Improvement Evident.

Nothing more eloquent of the growth of Jacksonville is obtainable than the fact that the Bank of Jacksonville in six days less than one year has made a growth of 143 per cent. This growth is shown by recent statements of the bank.

When Benjamin M. Collins, former city recorder of Medford, went to Jacksonville and assumed the duties of cashier, the deposits in the bank amounted to \$23,893.16. One year later, lacking six days, the deposits amounted to \$58,266.38, or an increase of a little more than 143 per cent.

Much of the growth is attributed to the ability of Mr. Collins, who acquires friends easily, and, what is more, holds them.

The stockholders of the bank are: J. W. Bybee, A. W. Sturgis, Charles Dunford, W. P. Bailey, Benjamin M. Collins, John G. Dunnington, C. M. Rueh, John W. Pernoll, Ralph G. The directors are: J. W. Bybee, John W. Pernoll, John G. Dunnington, C. M. Rueh, W. H. Bowen and Benjamin M. Collins.

The officers are: J. W. Bybee, president; John W. Pernoll, vice president; Benjamin M. Collins, cashier; W. H. Bowen, assistant cashier, and William H. Johnson, secretary.

The bank since Mr. Collins took hold has opened a savings department and pays interest on time deposits and have equipped themselves with foreign exchange accommodations.

Jacksonville is making great strides in civic improvements. They are installing a water system at a cost of \$50,000, and are contemplating the installation of a sewer system.

Dissension Prevails Over Distribution of Senator's Millions—Late Millionaire Was Married Twice and Children are Dissatisfied With Will.

ELKINS, W. Va., Feb. 2.—Dissension prevails in the Elkins family today as a result of the disposition Stephen B. Elkins, late senator from West Virginia, made of his millions. Elkins was twice married, and his widow, Mrs. Hallie D. Elkins, is dissatisfied with the provision he made for her children. Elkins provided that his seven children, including Mrs. Oliphant and Mrs. Weiderseim, children of his first wife, should share equally. If Mrs. Elkins claims one-third of the estate, which the state law allows, she will have from five to eight millions in her own right to divide among her five children.
