

# HANDLESS MAN URGES NEW LAW

Appears Before Voluntary Committee and Offers to Go to Salem and Work for Better Workman's Compensation Act.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 6. — Robert E. Roland of this city, handleless and dependent rendered so by an accident in the West Side Lumber and Shingle company last April, appeared before the voluntary committee, which is fighting for the cause of the injured workman by the adoption of a workman optional compensation act by the legislature and offered to go before the judiciary committee when the advocates of the above bill given a hearing Monday night and exhibit himself as a victim of the present system of recovering personal injury damages.

Mr. Roland said today: "If I were a soldier, injured as I am, I would be receiving a pension of \$75 per month. I am injured in the industrial battle, and lost my case in court. I now find myself wholly dependent on others at the age of forty-three with a wife and three children whom I am unable to support. I desire to do my part toward convincing the people of Oregon that without a just compensation act, any law however drastic, is unjust and unworkable. Injured laboring men need instant relief at time of injury."

A coincidence of Mr. Roland's appearance before the committee is that while there he met Frank C. Young manager of the West Side Lumber and Shingle company, against whom he lost his suit when injured. Mr. Young is now one of the most aggressive fighters for the adoption of the compensation act.

## NO POTATO SHORTAGE IN CALIFORNIA SAYS KING

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 6.—There is no danger of a potato or onion famine in this state, according to Morris Zuckerman, the "potato king" of California and head of the largest produce concern in Los Angeles.

"In Southern California we have been confronted with a situation that has occasioned a slight increase in the price of potatoes and at the same time given rise to the rumor of a famine," said Zuckerman today. "Washouts on the railroads between here and Salt Lake have prevented shipments of spuds coming in. We were well stocked up with potatoes here, however, and had thousands of sacks of onions in storage. We naturally took advantage of the situation to make a little money. Within a week we will have carloads of potatoes in. The Salt Lake supply of potatoes is practically exhausted, and we will not have to turn to Ohio, but as far as a famine is concerned, reports to that effect are unfounded. There are plenty of onions."

## RAILROAD LOSES A BIG CASE IN CANADA

LONDON, Feb. 6.—Judgment was given out today by the privy council in the case of the minister of public works of province of Alberta against the Canadian Pacific Railroad. This was a test case regarding the exemption of the lands Canadian Pacific lands from taxation and resulted in a victory for the railway company all along the line, the case being dismissed without cost. Their lordships hold that unoccupied land were not taxable until 20 years after the actual grant of letters of patent to the settler, even should be there a delay of many years on his part in taking out those letters of patent. They also held that C. P. R. lands sold on the installment plan are not taxable until all the installments are paid.

## GEORGE GREY, NOBLEMAN DIES IN EAST AFRICA

LONDON, Feb. 6. — Dispatches from Nairobi, East Africa, today tell of the death there of George Grey, brother of Sir Edmund Grey, the British Minister of Foreign Affairs, as the result of being mugged by a lion.

Grey, who was hunting in the same country as that traversed by Colonel Roosevelt, became separated from his companions, near the Athi River. Rousing a lion from a thicket he fired and wounded the animal, but was knocked down by its charge and before he could fire a second time was frightfully clawed.

## JEROME SAYS ROBIN INSANE

Refuses to Enter Bankers Plan in Court—Belligerent Attitude of Lawyer is Rebuked by Judge—Indicted for Bank Wrecking.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6. — Sticking fast to his contention that his client, Joseph Robin, wrecker of the Northern Bank of New York, is insane, former District Attorney Jerome today, in Judge Swann's court, refused to enter a plea. The court ordered that a plea of not guilty be entered.

When Robin was indicted on eight counts which charged larceny of more than \$100,000, Jerome interposed a demurrer to the presentments, calling the attention of the court that they did not conform with the law, having been improperly signed by the district attorney.

In the arguments that followed Judge Swann overruled the demurrer. Jerome then refused to plead. His belligerent attitude was rebuked by Judge Swann and his attempts to evade trial were frowned down.

## LAKE COUNTY EXPECTS TO SEE SPRING EARLY

LAKEVIEW, Or., Feb. 6.—Many of the old settlers and others qualified to make weather predictions for Lake County, declare that the first robin of the season, seen here last Sunday is a forerunner of an early spring. This year has been remarkably mild and outside of a little snow and a few days of cold weather, there has been nothing like it in years. The prospects for the coming year are bright and the stock on the ranges is in fine condition and fully able to stand any ordinary winter weather that may come between now and spring.
