Tribune: Wolgast was outpointed, outfought and outboxed.

WILL TRY TO CROSS THE ATLANTIC IN A BALLOON

KIEL, Germany, Feb. 9.—The German airship Richard with which an attempt is to be made to cross the Atlantic is practically complete here, and all arrangements are being made for its first trial on February 15. It all goes well at the trials the big dirigible will be then be shipped to St. Vincent Cape Verde where it will await favorable winds before its departure for the American shore.

No Phone Combine.

CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 9. Announcement that the United States government would interfere has apparently killed the proposed agreement, or consolidation of the Bell and the Independent Telephone systems.

PAPERS ARE FILED FOR GRANTS PASS-ROGUE RIVER LINE

Proposed Route is From Point on Coast Through Grants Pass to Idaho Border; Incorporators are Portlanders.

PORTLAND, Feb. 9.—Articles of incorporation have been filed with the county clerk by the Grants Pass & Rogue River Railroad company. The capital stock is placed at \$900,000, divided into 9000 shares at \$100 each. The incorporators are H. L. Chaplin, J. G. Riggs and A. D. Bowen of this city.

The purpose of the company is to build railroads from Grants Pass to a point on the coast and to Idaho, according to the articles.

This is the proposition for which the people of Grants Pass have been subscribing a subsidy of \$75,000, and it is understood that the Pacific coast terminal of the road will be Crescent City, Cal. By the way of Grants Pass the road is to cross the state to Idaho, where it is believed it is intended to connect with one of the transcontinental lines.

The proposed line will tap the rich Applegate valley. Messrs. Bowen and Chaplin left for Grants Pass last night on business in connection with the project.

WOMAN INJURED IN STREET COLLISION

As the result of a collision yesterday afternoon between an automobile driven by Miss Sullivan, daughter of J. T. Sullivan of this city and a buggy in which an unknown woman was driving, the latter received a severe shaking up but, after restored by Dr. Seely, resumed her journey without giving her name.

The accident was caused when both tried to make a crossing at the same time. The woman with the buggy brought her horse to a stop suddenly and Miss Sullivan, who was expecting her to drive by could not bring the machine to a standstill.

ALLEGED BRIBER PUT ON TRIAL

Former Senator Frank Gardner Faces Jury—Stated That He Accepted to Influence Votes on Anti-Racing Bill.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—Charged with an attempt to bribe former State Senator Otto Foelker to vote against the anti-racing bill which stopped betting in New York state, former Senator Frank Gardner was placed on trial today. Gardner has been out on bail since he was brought back from Scranton, Pa., two months ago to testify before the legislative graft committee, on which occasion he refused to talk.

Before the committee witnesses swore that Gardner offered them money to vote against the anti-racing law. District Attorney Whitman claims to have new evidence which will secure a conviction.

Cold Storage Hit.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Feb. 9. Holding to reserve a basket of eggs which were laid about 1200 R. C., Senator Hare today secured the passage of his bill providing a fine of \$250 for any person who shall sell or exhibit for sale eggs or butter that have been in cold storage more than three months without duly labeling the exhibits.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Feb. 9.—The eight-hour law for female employees was unanimously passed this afternoon by the state assembly.

Market Is Heavy.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—Today's opening stock market was heavy. Most of the favorites declined fractionally. Atchison, Canadian Pacific, Lehigh Valley, Northern Pacific and Southern Railway preferred lost a point or more. Around noon the market rallied, Canadian Pacific taking the lead with a rise of a point above last night's close. Failure of the Bank of England directors to reduce the discount rate had an unfavorable effect. The market closed steady. Bonds were firm.
