MINING TAKES ON NEW LIFE.

trough in front of one of the hotels on the main street of Jacksonville last week, Mr. Getchell's eye was caught by two small shining particles lying in the dirt at his feet which, upon investigation, proved to be two small particles of gold which had probably been washed down the street by rain.

Another find was made two weeks ago within a few feet of the same spot. The proprietor of a barber shop in Jacksonville was the lucky man in this instance and the "nugget" which he discovered lying in the gutter of a travelled highway proved to be worth \$7.

Among the properties doing the greatest amount of development work probably the Opp mine holds the lead.

About a month ago, a body of ore was struck in tunnel 18 on this property, while actual values have been withheld, it said to be rich.

The discovery was made almost a month ago and since that time the attentions of the working force at the mine, whose daily average is approximately 80 tons, have been directed almost solely to exploring and working in the new vein.

The ore is a mixture of free milling gold and sulphides, which, worked through a classifier at the mine, are sorted; the free milling ore being worked on the property while the portion containing the sulphides is shipped to Tacoma for treatment.

The mine is situated within two miles of the railroad at Jacksonville, and while a railroad further into the mineral country, it is not affected by this cause as much as most of the other properties are.

"Whereas, at a recent general election the voters of the state of Oregon by a majority of more than 16,000 decided that all commercial fishing for salmon in Rogue river shall cease, and,

"Whereas the Oregon house of representatives on February 9 passed a bill repealing the Rogue river law acting upon the plea that the voters were mistaken, and,

"Whereas, the initiative system by such a repeal of the people's vote simply becomes a farce and an incentive for corporations to corrupt our legislature,

"Therefore, be it resolved, by the Central Labor council of Portland and vicinity, that we insist that our legislators respect the votes of their constituents and leave initiative measures alone; and be it further—

"Resolved, that Governor West is hereby appealed to to veto this or any attack upon the initiative laws."

STATUE OF LIBERTY IS NOW OUT OF STYLE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—The Goddess of Freedom, overlooking the city of Washington from the top of the capitol's dome, is without a valet. And, what is more, Elliott Woods, superintendent of the capitol, who sees to the comforts of the goddess, has determined that, in keeping with the spirit of economy that is prevalent throughout the capitol this year, the goddess will not have a regular valet appointed to look after her.

The valet who looked after the goddess for years died a few weeks ago. In the future an outsider—a specialist in the particular work to be done—will be called in to manicure her nails, tonic her hair, retrim her headgear or attend to other little things that will keep the goddess good looking. must receive much care. Every little while the valuable platinum in her crown must be replenished, her gown must be cleaned and her face, feet and hands washed.

To attend to the wants of Her Majesty, a man of special qualifications is required. The goddess is about 290 feet from the ground and stands 19 feet 6 inches in height. There is considerable of her to be cared for, and it requires a man of steady nerves to work for her. A former valet was once asked why the sculptor did not make her 11-inch hand an inch longer, and the inquirer was told that if the hand had been made 12 inches it would have been a foot.

The goddess is pretty well satisfied with the gown and headgear she has worn for years, despite the changes in fashions. A proposal was once made that the statue be gilded, but Senator Cockrell raised his voice in protest.

"Before I get back there," he said when the proposal was under consideration, "the grass around the capitol will be whitewashed."

whitewash the grass," remarked a capitol employe when he repeated the story a few days ago, "because Senator Cockrell went away after that speech and the legislature of Missouri did not let him come back."
