DYNAMITERS OF TIMES WERE HERE

Detectives Search Cabin on Outskirts of Town and Find Clue in Small Square Piece of Cardboard on Which is Writing.

The search for desperate criminals often leads to places far remote from the scene of their crimes. Medford is many miles from Los Angeles, the scene of the recent dastardly crime of blowing up the Times, but the men who "turned the trick" have been here. Authentic information that these desperadoes came to this town shortly after the dynamiting has been received by local railroad officials and state police officers are here trying to pick a clue which will lead to the present whereabouts of the murderers.

An anonymous letter to the head of the S. P.'s detective department was the first clue to the whereabouts of the robbers. Acting on the information conveyed in the letter, detectives came here and began a quiet scrutiny of the suspected individuals, who occupied the small house on the outskirts of the town, which was the home of a recluse who recently died. The detectives obtained permission of the police department to locate themselves nearby, and from this point of vantage they kept close watch on the men. Yesterday afternoon an auto came up and the men (there were four of them) climbed aboard.

The detectives had a machine at their disposal and they quickly started in pursuit, first detailing two of their number to make a search of the hut. The search revealed that the men had considered themselves safe from pursuit, for the cabin was well stocked with provisions. On a shelf just behind the door the officers found a ticket to "The Military Girl," which is to be given soon for the benefit of the local high school.
