TWO GOOD ROADS BILLS ARE PASSED

That Will Be All for This Year—Counties May Bond—State Highway Commission is Provided for in Measures.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 15.—The good roads legislation at the present session of the legislature will consist of the substitute highway commission bill, declared highly acceptable by friends of the plan, and the county bonding act introduced by Gill of Hood River, and revised in the special committee.

The two bills were passed by the house while the state aid bill was placed on the table because the Grangers were not very favorable to it and the Multnomah county members did not desire to force upon them a measure to which the largest county would contribute more than a third of the funds. The same fate will be met by the two convict roads bills.

TWO LADS FIGHT FOR GIRL'S SMILE

UNCLE SAM IS AFTER HOMESTEAD

Proceedings Instituted Before Special Examiner George H. Durham—Property is Situated Near Merlin in Josephine County.

Charging that he had come into possession of a portion of land by means of fraud, and that he had not lived up to the residential requirements the government has instituted proceedings before Special Examiner George H. Durham, of the United States Circuit Court, to annul the patent to the old Cooksie homestead on the Rogue River in the Galice country now held by Harry L. Lewis.

The property is situated seven miles west of Merlin, and adjoins another tract of 160 acres owned by Lewis. Lewis purchased a relinquishment to the property from Cooksie and later secured a patent on the property, but the government, through Assistant United States Attorney Robert F. Maguire and a number of witnesses, will attempt to prove that Lewis at no time lived on the property, and that he made his home upon his own section.

The hearing is being held in Grants Pass and will close probably today.
