### PREPARE WORK FOR SUMMER

Forest Office Busy Outlining Plans for Campaign Against Fire Menace This Summer—Badly Handicapped by Lack of Necessary Funds.

Plans are in course of preparation in the local office of the forest service for the work to be done in the Crater national forest in preparation for the coming summer, and while everything depends upon the amount of money appropriated with which to carry on the work, it is believed that sufficient new work will be possible to keep an increased force busy.

The work of building the portion of the Crater Lake road situated within the boundaries of the forest will be commenced about April 1. This work is being carried on under a provision of \$5000 recently made for the purpose of which a part will be apportioned for the work to be done within the forest limits. The road is now passable and about 15 men will be put to work upon it. With the exception of a bridge across Whiskey creek, almost 10 miles of the road has already been constructed and eight miles more will be added to it this summer. It is hoped to open the road by the latter part of June.

No provision has as yet been made by the war department for the stationing of United States troops in the forests during the summer months and it is feared that the proposed move has been allowed to die for want of sufficient agitation, but a number of extra fire guards will be stationed in the forest from time to time until, by July 1 a sufficient number to handle any ordinary blaze will have been put to work.

### EARLY SETTLER ON ROGUE DIES

John McKee, a Resident in the Valley Since 1853, Passed Away Wednesday Afternoon at Eagle Point—Here Through "Indian" Days.

The funeral of John McKee, a resident in the Rogue River valley since 1853, who died at Eagle Point Wednesday afternoon, will take place Friday afternoon at the McKee cemetery, on Forest creek, near Jacksonville.

Mr. McKee, who was 83 years old, died as the result of general debility.

He came to this country when 26 years old and located upon the property on Forest creek where his remains will be interred. He mined there for a while and later took up agricultural pursuits. He moved to the Big Butte country 20 years ago, which property he held until his death. A portion of his original donation claim is now a portion of the Hillier orchard.

The body, which is now held by the Perl Undertaking company, will be taken to the cemetery tomorrow, where a short burial service will be read at the grave.

He is survived by nine sons and daughters.

The funeral party will leave the Perl undertaking company's chapel at 10 o'clock Friday morning. The Rev. L. L. Belknap will officiate.
