LAWMAKERS FEAR FOR DEAR PEOPLE

Effort to Amend Initiative Acts Again Before House Yesterday, but It Fails to Pass—Bitter Words Are Spoken.

STATEHOUSE, Salem, Or., Feb. 17.—One of the most remarkable features of the present legislative session has been the solicitude shown by the members for the people and their fear that in some way or other the populace will make a mistake resulting in injury to the great masses—the proletariat. It was shown when the will of the people in closing Rogue river to all but hook and line fishing was overridden, and it was strongly in evidence yesterday afternoon in the arguments on the question of taxation, as contained in senate and house joint resolutions.

Three of the senate measures, Nos. 8, 9 and 10, came up for first debate. They are companion resolutions and deal generally with the subject of taxation. The first proposes a constitutional amendment as regards taxation without consent, and the third would abolish the poll tax. They would restore to the legislature the power of taxation, and if favored by the people would repeal the constitutional provision enacted by the initiative.

Four members of the committee reported favorably on the resolutions, but Fouts brought in a minority report. He frankly admitted that he does not understand the single tax feature very well, but declared that he does believe in home rule, and that every county should have the right to frame its own laws if given it by the people. He wanted taxation in the case of wealthy land owners carried out to a "fare-ye-well."

McKinney insisted that the burden of taxation under such a scheme would fall largely on the farmers, "who are already overburdened with taxation." McKinney's constituency is largely comprised of farmers and he plays to it with fidelity, even though he may at times strike a false chord. Nobody could justly accuse him of not trying to get everything in sight for eastern Oregon—he admits that that is what he comes to Salem for.

Carter, who "stands for the people first, last and all the time," declared the adoption of the resolutions would strike a blow at their enactment.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Feb. 17.—The significance of the announcement made today in Washington by President Gompers to the effect that the unions of Los Angeles are raising half a million dollars to fight the open shop, said Secretary Andrew J. Gallagher of the San Francisco Labor Council, who is in Sacramento, "is that the rumored general strike to be inaugurated in Los Angeles will be launched about March 1. This will be the greatest and most significant fight between the champions of the open shop and the forces of organized labor ever waged in the

United States. For the past two years every union labor man in California has been assessed 25 cents per week as contribution to the fund used in fighting the open shop in Los Angeles.
