

MANY BILLS PASS COUNCIL

Street Paving, Sewer and Water In-Large Quantity Are Passed by Council Upon Third Reading of Same.

At the regular meeting of the city council last night, the following resolutions for street paving, sewer installation, etc., were passed at their third reading:

Paving.

Queen Anne from Roosevelt to Oregon Terrace.

Riverside from Jackson to north city limits. The petition called for forty feet. Council ordered change to thirty-six feet width.

North Bartlett from Sixth to Jackson. Forty feet wide from Sixth to Fifth, thirty-six feet for the rest of distance.

Grape street from Sixth street to Eighth. Pavement forty feet wide.

Jackson street from Riverside to Columbia avenue. To be thirty-six feet wide.

South Orange from Main to West Tenth, pavement to be thirty feet wide.

Sixth street from Riverside to D'Anjou. Forty foot pavement.

West Eighth from Oakdale to Fir. Forty foot pavement.

West Sixth street from Southern Pacific right of way to Oakdale. Laid over for reconsideration of width.

Ivy street from Main to Sixth, to be thirty-eight foot pavement.

Second street from west city limits to Holly. Paved thirty feet wide.

Oakdale from Fifth to Palm. Thirty foot pavement.

Grape from Eighth to south city limits. Pavement to be thirty-six feet.

D'Anjou from Sixth to Jackson. From Sixth to Fourth to be thirty-eight foot pavement, from Fourth to Jackson thirty-six foot pavement.

Eighth street from Central to Riverside. Pavement to be forty feet.

Fourth from Oakdale to west city limits. Pavement to be thirty-six feet.

Sewers.

Council accepted sewer district No. 13, as defined.

Following ordinances passes:

Six inch sewer lateral on block four, from Fourth to Jackson.

Six inch sewer along block nine to south line of Third street.

Six inch lateral sewer in alley on block seven from North Third.

Six inch lateral from north line of Willike addition along Almond street from East Main.

Eight inch sewer on Knight from Taft street to Grape.

Eight inch sewer from center line of Knight street to be continued.

Six inch lateral sewer in D'Anjou from Second to Fourth.

Six inch lateral sewer from along alley of block seventy-three between Eleventh and Twelfth.

Cement walks ordered on these streets:

Both sides of Vancouver avenue from East Main end of street. Walks to be five feet.

Both sides of King street from Eleventh to Dakota avenue. Five-foot walk.

Assessments were levied for six inch and eight inch sewer on Geneva street from Sherman street to 140 feet north of Main street. Ninety-one cents per front foot.

Eight inch sewer on Sherman street from Geneva to Geneva. One dollar and twenty-two cents per front foot.

Water Mains.

Four inch water main on Geneva street from Sherman to East Main. Eighty-five cents per front foot.

Six inch water main on East Washington from Howard to Roosevelt. \$1.12 1-2 per front foot.

Four inch water main on Peach from Main to Eighth streets. Eighty-four cents per front foot.

Four inch water main on Knight street from Taft to Vermont.

Four inch water main on Peach street from Dakota to south city limits referred to water committee.

Four inch water main on D'Anjou from Second to Jackson.

Four inch water main on Portland avenue from East Main to south boundary of city.

Streets.

No protest received for the street which is to cut through the Jackson street school grounds. Ordered put through.

TRANNA ASKS TO RAISE WAGES

Superintendent of the Water Department Requests Council to Make Changes in His Department—Would Sell Junk.

George Tranna, the newly appointed superintendent of the city water department, last night submitted a communication to the city council advocating a number of changes necessary in the department over which he has control, and among other things offered several suggestions by which the city will be enabled to convert a number of useless articles into cash.

The present delapidated condition of the roof of the pumping plant was pointed out by Tranna and also the fact that it is at present necessary to hide all tools as the locks on the doors are useless.

The fact that a steam boiler of the capacity of 60 horse-power, and two pumps, now of no use to the city although in good condition, might be converted into cash, and that a similar disposition could be made of several tons of old hydrants, worth 90 cents per hundred at the foundry, and also a quantity of old brass was contained in the communication.

Tranna asked for a new building, or at least that the present structure be equipped with sanitary arrangements that will make it habitable and ended his letter with a request that something be done to establish a definite wage scale for the water department, that the present daily wage of \$2.50 for tap-men be raised to \$3 as the latter sum is none too great if competent and steady men are to be employed.

The communication was referred to the proper committee for consideration.

CITY CONSIDERS TO BUILD HOTEL AT EAGLE POINT

Matter is Referred to Light and Water Committee of Council—Estimate is Submitted by Rogue River Electric and Bid Entered.

Whether, or not the city will accept the proposition made to the city council last night by the Rogue River Electric company regarding the installation and maintenance of a number of cluster lights is now up to the light and water committee of the council, to which body the electric company's communication was referred at a meeting of the council last night for action.

According to the proposition made by the Gold Ray people, they will agree, providing a contract covering a period of 10 years is entered into, to supply the city with power to operate 60 cluster lights, of five 40-watt Tungsten lamps each, for 50 cents per lamp per month. The lamps to be illuminated from the hours of dusk to midnight. The city must pay all the cost of installing the system.

In the event of this not being acceptable, the company will, upon the signing of an agreement by the city for a period of 10 years, furnish the city with power with which to run such a system at the rate of 4 cents per kilowatt hour.

The figures submitted by the electric company show that the installation of each cluster will cost the city \$32.05, the estimate being itemized as follows:
