BUTLAR TRIAL GOES TO DOX

Non-Support Case Against Son of Wealthy Portland Attorney to Be Heard in Jacksonville—Absence From City of Judge Taylor.

The trial of Ralph Butler, arrested by the police of Portland last week upon a warrant sworn to by District Attorney B. F. Mulkey here charging him with non-support of his wife, will be held before Justice of the Peace Henry G. Dox in Jacksonville Tuesday. The case is transferred to Jacksonville from Justice Glenn O. Taylor's court here, he being at present out of the city.

According to the information in the hands of the district attorney's office, Butler, who is a son of a prominent Portland attorney, and who is now a student in a dental college in Portland, married the woman he is now accused of refusing to support in California. She is now employed, when the condition of her health permits her to work, in a store in Ashland.

Butler was arrested in Portland and released on \$250 bail. He came to this city this morning in response to a communication from Constable Singler to the effect that the trial was about to be called. Judge E. E. Kelley is his counsel.

WILL WRESTLE AT NATATORIUM

Carl Busch, Middle Weight Champion to Meet Dyreborg, of Sacramento, in Catch as Catch Can, Two Falls Out of Three on Wednesday Night.

What is promised will be one of the finest wrestling exhibitions ever given before an audience in this city will take place in the Natatorium next Wednesday night, when Carl Busch, who claims the middleweight championship of the United States, will meet L. W. Dyreborg, wrestling instructor to the Sacramento, Cal., Athletic club, in a catch-as-catch-can match, two falls out of three. The men will wrestle for the gate receipts, the winner to take 60 per cent.

Dyreborg, who is better known to followers of the "mat" game by the name of "L. Walters," has wrestled here before, and although beaten by Busch in a match at Roseburg held on February 16, he feels that under ordinary conditions he can give the Dutchman a better run for his money. In the Roseburg go, Dyreborg, who stayed with Busch for one hour and three minutes before the latter secured a fall, claims that he was not in condition when he went onto the mat, being ill and tired from the long journey by train from Sacramento.

Busch, on the other hand, claims superiority over Dyreborg by virtue of experience and proficiency in the wrestling art. Born in Germany, he spent his younger days touring the country with troupes of wrestlers according to the European custom. While traveling thus, he met Hackenschmidt, the Russian Lion, and numerous other wrestlers at the Graeco-Roman style. Later, after he came to this country, he learned the catch-as-catch-can style peculiar to this country. He has been here five years, and has tried his skill against the best men here. He wrestled Frank Gotch for the championship of the world in 1908 at Rochester, N. Y., and was thrown by the champion in 45 minutes. At other times he has met Farmer Burns, who gave up after an hour, Burns being at the time an old man and only giving an exhibition bout; Tom Jenkins, Tom Cannon, Bob Managoff, the Terrible Turk, whom he threw in 11 minutes; Al Solomon and many others. He won the middleweight title in Springfield, Ill., in March, 1909, by defeating Monson, the Swedish Giant.

The match here Wednesday will be preceded by a preliminary between two local boys and will be entirely free from anything offensive. Accommodations will be provided for ladies wishing to witness the match and it is expected that many will be present.

CAME TO COAST AT AGE SIXTEEN

Mrs. Augusta Helms, Pioneer Woman on Pacific Coast Dies at Home in Jacksonville She Entered as a Bride Fifty Years Ago.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Augusta Helms, 73 years old, who died at the family residence at Jacksonville shortly before midnight last Saturday, will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. A short service will be read by the Rev. Ennis at the family home, after which the remains will be taken to the Jacksonville cemetery for interment.

To Mrs. Helms belonged the distinction of being one of the pioneer white women on the Pacific coast. She was born in Hamburg, but came to this country at the age of 16. With her parents she took up her residence in Yreka, Cal., but came to Jacksonville in 1861. The day after her arrival in this county she married Herman V. Helms, and as a bride moved into the home in Jacksonville in which her death occurred. She became a widow in 1899. She was a charter member of the Ruth lodge of the Rebekahs and also a member of Adair lodge, Jacksonville, of the Eastern Star. The services at the grave Tuesday will be held under the auspices of the Rebekah Sisters.

Although nine children were born to the couple, only five now survive her, and these, all residents of Jacksonville, are: Mrs. James Cronmiller, Miss Monda Helms, Mrs. Anna Bland, Harry Helms and Edward Helms.

Death was due to Bright's disease.

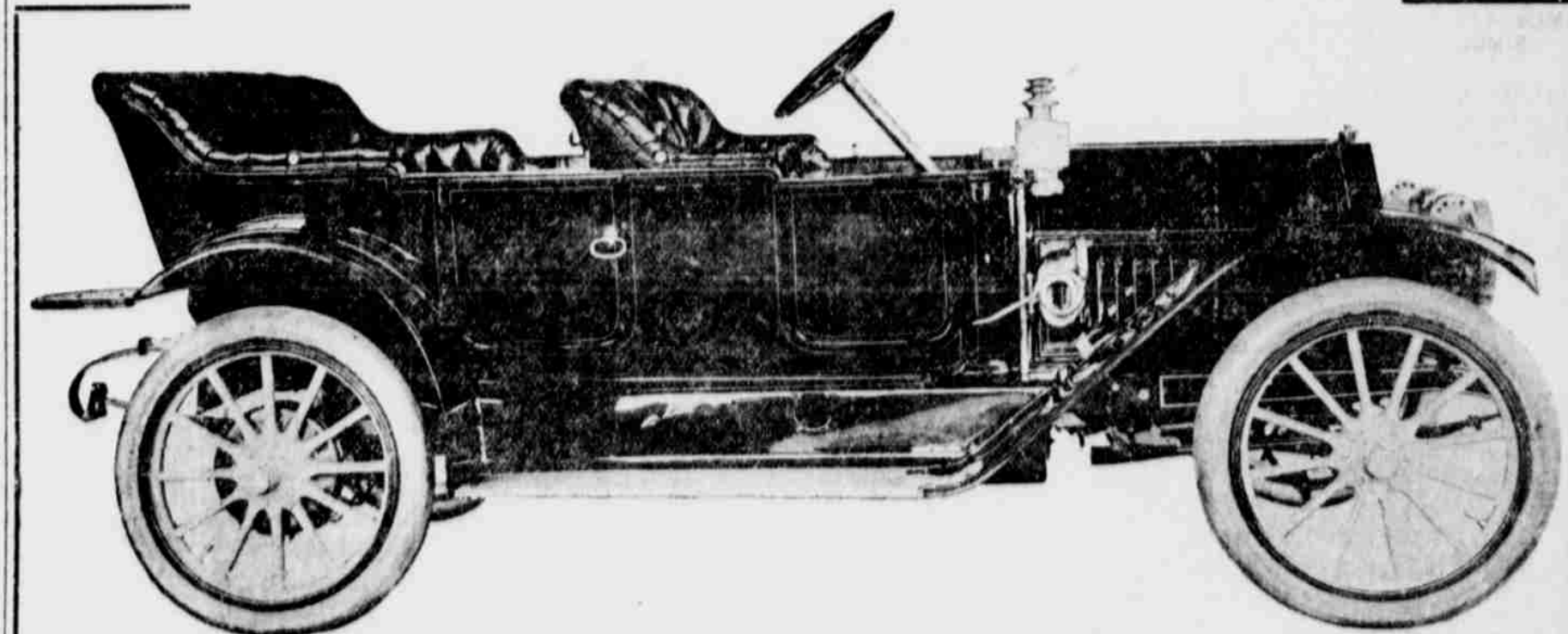
