MAILS ROBBED OF \$25,000

Registered Parcels Taken Off Steamer Princess Beatrice On Her Way from Skagway, Alaska, to Vancouver, B. C.

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 1.—Though the police authorities along the coast at American as well as Canadian points have been working since dawn yesterday in an effort to find traces of the thieves who robbed the registered mails from the Steamer Princess Beatrice on her way from Skagway to Vancouver, the situation today remains as great a mystery as ever. Postmaster McPherson said he does not know how much loot the robbers secured, but believed it is valued at more than \$25,000. Before the Beatrice landed in Victoria yesterday morning a thorough search had been made of her with a view of finding that the bags might have been mislaid. Several of the passengers submitted to a personal search at the hands of the police.

It is still considered by the police that the robbers got over the side of the Beatrice at Prince Rupert. It is believed that they will make their way into the interior and the Royal North West Mounted Police at Edmonton have been advised of the robbery in consequence.

HELMS FUNERAL WAS HELD TUESDAY

The funeral of the late Mrs. Augusto Helms, who died at her home in Jacksonville last Saturday night at the age of 73 years, was held from the family residence Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Rev. Ennis read a short funeral service after which the remains were taken to the Jacksonville cemetery for interment. The Ruth lodge of the Rebekahs, of which the deceased was a member were in charge of the burial which was conducted by the Perl undertaking company.

MEDFORD EXPLORERS REACH CRATER LAKE

The Fort Klamath correspondent of the Klamath Chronicle reports the discovery of Crater Lake by engineer B. F. Heidel, first supervisor, M. L. Erickson and Harry H. Hicks (Medford's Dr. Cook) who reached the lake on snow shoes. The Medford explorers are assisting in the search for B. B. Bakowski, the missing photographer, who was lost in Crater Lake national park a month ago. Bakowski's camera cases were found at the hotel building on the rim of the lake, but his supplies, including bedding and food are missing, which leads to the belief that he is still alive and probably camped on the other side of the lake.

TACOMA NOW BOASTS A MUNICIPAL DOCK

TACOMA, Wash., March 1.—Puget Sound steamers are today arriving at and departing from Tacoma's new municipal dock, the first of its kind to be constructed and operated on the Pacific Coast. The dock, which is a temporary one, was dedicated last night with 5000 persons taking part in the exercises. A permanent dock is to be erected near the present one which will cost \$400,000 and is expected to be one of the finest buildings of the kind in the country. Passengers are now landed in the heart of the city instead of at an unprotected and remote wharf as previously was the case.

EIGHT HOUR BILL TO PASS AT SACRAMENTO

SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 1.—Assemblyman Griffin's eight hour law for women employees was reported favorably today by the senate committee on capital and labor, practically ensuring its passage and approval by the governor. Senator Hurd will seek to amend the bill on the floor by increasing the time provision to 45 hours a week and excluding hotels and offices from the places allowed to employ women for eight hours only.
