THREE GRADES OF APPLES IS PLAN

Northwest Fruitgrowers' Association in Convention at Walla Walla Adopts Standard Grades—Whisler to be in Charge of This District.

WALLA WALLA, Mich. 2.—The organization of a central fruit selling agency for the northwest was favored by the Northwest Fruitgrowers Association in convention here. The fruit districts were each made a division and a grower was placed in charge of each. C. E. Whisler of Medford will be the representative of the Rogue River Valley district.

Three grades of apples will be packed in the northwest hereafter, to be known as extra fancy, standard and "C."

Extra Fancy Grade.

This grade consists of perfect well formed apples only, free from all insect pests, worm holes, stings, scale, scab, sun scald, dry rot, water core or other defects; limb rub, skin puncture or evidence of rough handling shall be considered defects. All apples heavily coated with dirt or spray must be cleaned.

All varieties of apples admitted to the grade shall be well matured and of natural color characteristic of the variety; Spitzenberg, Winesap, Jonathan, Arkansas Black, Gano, Lawlor and other solid red varieties, must have 75 per cent of good red color.

Ben Davis' Rome Beauty, Baldwin Wagoner and other varieties of similar color must be 50 per cent red. Red Cheek Pippins and Winter Bananas must show a red cheek.

Standard Grade.

Apples of this grade must be free from all insect pests, worm, holes, scale, scab larger than a nickel, sun scald, dry rot, water core or other defects; skin puncture or evidence of rough handling shall be considered defects. Slight limb rub, or one small sting healed over, or scab not larger than a nickel will be permitted, providing not over 10 per cent of the apples admitted to this grade shall be well matured and of natural color. Red varieties must show some red.

"C" Grade.

This grade shall be made up of all merchantable apples not included in the extra fancy, or standard grades. These apples must be free from all insect pests, worm holes or scale, but will include misshapen apples, or apples having a limb rub or other like defects. Apples of this grade may also contain two worm stings or apples showing slight bruises. They need not be wrapped.

In selling this fruit it is understood that all specifications of these grades shall be complied with, as far as it is practical.

CIRCUIT COURT TAKES RECESS

Will Resume Work Friday Morning Where It Left Off Wednesday—M. & C. L. Railroad Case, Long on Docket, is Dismissed.

The circuit court, in session Wednesday at the court house in Jacksonville took a recess during the afternoon session until Friday morning when it will resume the hearings of the cases on the docket.

During the session yesterday, Judge F. M. Calkins granted Robert Boswell a divorce from his wife, Louvena Boswell. The case was not contested and the decree was granted by default.

Mike Wooly, applicant for a divorce from Mary Jane Wooly also secured a decree by default.

A case of long standing on the docket, that of J. F. Reddy, receiver for the defunct Crater Lake Railroad company against J. A. McCall et al, for an accounting, was finally disposed of yesterday when Judge Calkins ordered a dismissal of the proceedings.

R. C. F. Astbury et al, plaintiffs, in action to bring about a foreclosure against H. A. Vogel et al, agreed upon the dismissal of the case, with the result that, upon a stipulation of the attorneys in the case, Judge Calkins ordered a dismissal.

The application of Charles Carney et al to register title was granted by default, the defendants, E. F. Meade, et al, failing to contest the case.

The court overruled the application of H. R. Allen, defendant in an action to recover money alleged to be due on a note brought by the Farmers' & Fruitgrowers' bank of this city, for a deannuer and gave the defendant 10 days in which to prepare a new plea.
