GALE RAGING CRATER LAKE

Blizzard Has Prevailed for Past Three Weeks—Little Doubt but That Photographer Bakowski Perished—Probably Lost His Way.

CRATER LAKE LODGE, Feb. 27.—Whether H. H. Bakowski, a photographer of Burns, Or., plunged to his death over the snowy precipices of Crater Lake or was frozen to death in the blizzard which has held the lake in its embrace for the past three weeks will probably not be known until the summer sun has melted away the huge drifts of snow in that neighborhood. For the past four days a searching party from Fort Klamath has been at work trying to locate the missing man, but only traces of his camp were found. The searchers have been assisted by Benjamin F. Heidel, M. L. Erickson and myself. We arrived at the lake Saturday evening.

Bokowsky left Fort Klamath five weeks ago by himself to secure winter scenes at the lake. He had provisions for a month, and left word that if he did not return to come after him.

The searching parties have been greatly hampered by the severe blizzard which is raging at the lake. It is impossible to see over 200 yards ahead and snow is drifted many feet deep. A high gale prevails. The searchers have found his camera cases, his shoes and gloves but his tent and camp have not yet been located.

The party from Fort Klamath on Monday gave up the search leaving the Medford party to continue it.

Conditions at the lake are such that if Bokowsky remained in this neighborhood that it is impossible for him to be alive.

Be it Resolved by the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon: That there be and hereby is called a special election in and for the City of Medford, to be held on the 10th day of March, 1911, between the hours of 9:00 o'clock a. m. and 5:00 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said city, for their approval or rejection, the following entitled amendment to the charter of the City of Medford:

1. An amendment to the charter of the City of Medford, providing for a board of registration, and its duties and the registration of voters.

2. An amendment to the charter of the City of Medford amending section 72 thereof, providing for an increase of the bonded indebtedness of said City to the extent of \$30,000, said sum to be used for the sole purpose of making improvements in the water system of said city and paying for trunk, sanitary and storm sewers, heretofore or hereafter constructed by said city.

3. An amendment to the charter of the City of Medford, amending section 72 thereof, providing for an increase of the bonded indebtedness of said city to the extent of \$30,000, said sum to be used for the sole purpose of the improvement of the fire department of said city.

4. An amendment to the charter of the City of Medford, amending section 72 thereof, providing for the creation of a sinking fund for the purpose of the redemption of the bonds of the City of Medford.

5. An amendment to the charter of the City of Medford amending section 87 of said charter, providing for repayment of amount paid by purchasers at sales of property for delinquent assessments in said city in case the sale is vacated, set aside, or declared void by any court.

The following named persons are hereby appointed judges and clerks of said election:

First Ward: J. W. Ling judge, D. T. Lawton judge and clerk, L. L. Damon judge and clerk.

Second Ward: Joe Derry judge, Chas. P. Talent judge and clerk, Wm. Ulrich judge and clerk.

Third Ward: P. W. Chelgrin judge, J. Summerville judge and clerk, H. H. Lorimer judge and clerk.

The following are hereby designated as the places for holding said election:

First Ward: Hall over Haskins Drug store.

Second Ward: Hotel Nash sample rooms.

Third Ward: City Hall.

It is further resolved that the recorder of said City of Medford be and hereby is ordered to give notice of said election in the manner provided by the charter in the case of annual elections of said city.

The foregoing resolution was passed by the city council of the City of Medford, Oregon, on the 16th day of February, 1911, by the following vote:
