GAY RESIGNS WARDENSHIP

Protector of Game in Jackson County Sends in Resignation—Not Enough in Office to Pay for Time Put in—Several Applicants for Job.

Charles Gay has resigned as game warden and announces that he is not a candidate for reappointment. The resignation followed Governor West's call for the resignation of all game wardens so that the new game and fish board could start with a clean board, though Mr. Gay has long contemplated resigning.

"There is not enough in the office to pay me for wasting my time," said Mr. Gay. "I am really sorry that I did not get out of it before. While this last year, I have not made many arrests, I can truthfully assert that there are fewer game law violations in Jackson county than in any other section of the state."

"I have found loyal cooperation among the farmers and sportsmen generally, particularly among those who have recently come to the valley. There is a growing sentiment in favor of obeying the game laws and but little trouble is anticipated in the future."

Mr. Gay has been game warden for the past two years, and has a wide acquaintance and is very popular throughout the county. No complaints have ever been recorded against him and there is universal regret at his resignation.

There are several applicants for the position, which pays \$75 a month,

among them being Bob Taylor, Harry Mesler, Jack McGinn, Walter Moore and several others.
