EXTRA TRAINS FOR COLONISTS

Railroads Making Preparations for Great Immigration to Oregon—Thousands View Exhibits in Great Northern Car.

Special trains on many lines will carry colonists from the east to Oregon on several days within the low fare period which the railroads have announced from March 10 to April 10.

The Great Northern and Union Pacific roads have announced their intention of operating extra trains from eastern points and it is likely that other roads entering the northwest will do likewise. Because the exact volume of business cannot be forecast, the number of special trains cannot be arranged at this time.

Announcement has gone forth from the office of the Great Northern at St. Paul that a specially conducted excursion will be organized in the Mississippi valley and that a special train will be operated through to the coast. In a telegram received by H. A. Jackson, general agent of the freight department of the Great Northern, S. J. Ellison, who has charge of that road's Oregon's car which is touring the east, states that the attendance average 3000 daily and that from 600 to 1000 have been hearing the evening lectures held in the towns where the car exhibits. In consequence much interest is manifested in Oregon and many recruits for the personally conducted excursion are being obtained.

Specials to Run Out of Omaha. The Union Pacific has arranged to operate special trains out of Omaha on the first and last days of the colonist period. These trains will consist of tourist sleeping cars, California and will operate through to California and north Pacific points. On account of the greater interest in Oregon it is likely that most of them will have their destination in this state.

The first special will leave Omaha on Saturday, March 11. Others will follow on March 12 and March 13. April 8, 9, 10 and 11 also have been selected as dates upon which specials will leave Omaha. The trains are scheduled to start from the Nebraska city at 5 p. m. and will arrive in Portland at 11:15 a. m. on the third day following their departure.

They will carry all the tourist cars delivered to the Union Pacific at Omaha by eastern roads, excepting those cars that are taken on the regular trains. A fast schedule will be maintained, as the trains will not stop to take on passengers west of Omaha. They will operate on the Union Pacific, Oregon Short Line and O.-W. R. & N. line into Portland. In addition to the cars received at Omaha from the eastern connections other tourist sleepers will be filled there with colonists from western Nebraska and contiguous territory.

CITY NOTICES.

RESOLUTION.

Be it Resolved by the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon: That there be and hereby is called a special election in and for the City of Medford, to be held on the 10th day of March, 1911, between the hours of 9:00 o'clock a. m. and 5:00 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said city, for their approval or rejection, the following entitled amendment to the charter of the City of Medford:

1. An amendment to the charter of the City of Medford, providing for a board of registration, and its duties and the registration of voters.

2. An amendment to the charter of the City of Medford, amending section 72 thereof, providing for an increase of the bonded indebtedness of said City to the extent of \$30,000, said sum to be used for the sole purpose of making improvements in the water system of said city and paying for trunk, sanitary and storm sewers heretofore or hereafter constructed by said city.

3. An amendment to the charter of the City of Medford, amending section 72 thereof, providing for an increase of the bonded indebtedness of said City to the extent of \$50,000, said sum to be used for the sole purpose of the improvement of the fire department of said city.

4. An amendment to the charter of the City of Medford, amending section 87 of said charter, providing for repayment of amount paid by purchasers at sales of property for delinquent assessments in said city in case the sale is vacated, set aside, or declared void by any court.

The following named persons are hereby appointed judges and clerks of said election:

First Ward: J. W. Ling judge, D. L. Damon judge and clerk.

Second Ward: Joe Derry judge, Chas. P. Talent judge and clerk, Wm. Ulrich judge and clerk.

Third Ward: P. W. Chelgrin judge, J. Sumner judge and clerk, H. H. Lorimer judge and clerk.

The following are hereby designated as the places for holding said election.

First Ward: Hall over Haskins Drug store.

Second Ward: Hotel Nash sample rooms.

Third Ward: City Hall.

It is further resolved that the recorder of said City of Medford be and hereby is ordered to give notice of said election in the manner provided by the charter in the case of annual elections of said city.

The foregoing resolution was passed by the city council of the City of Medford, Oregon, on the 16th day of February, 1911, by the following vote: Merriek absent, Watt aye, Wortman aye, Emerick aye, Eifert aye, and Millar aye.
