Ashland Man Proclaims Innocence of Theft, Saying That He Only Took Friends Money to keep Others From Getting It—Held Under Bond

Charged with larceny from a dwelling, in having relieved A. E. Kellow of a sum of money believed to have been about \$40 after he had put Kellow to bed in a drunken condition in a lodging house in Ashland, Sam Sherry was this morning lodged in the county jail under \$1000 to await the action of the grand jury.

Kellow, it appears, passed out of the conscious stage quite early in the game and in a state bordering on the cataleptic was taken to a lodging house and put to bed by the other two. Sherry and Mauk then left to get something to eat and, while sitting in a restaurant, Sherry is alleged

ed have returned to Kellow's room and relieved him of his money. Kellow woke up several hours later, missed his money, and called on the police. Sherry was found and made to disgorge all of Kellow's money that he had not already spent. It was nearly all recovered.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 9.—Regret that the mobilization of troops on the Mexican frontier, if it prove to be only a mobilization was not made on the Pacific coast, was expressed today by former representative James McLachlan of California. "While I regret that the maneuvers are not to be held on the Pacific coast which in difficulty of transporting men, equipment and supplies would have been a more severe test of the organization of our mi-

The pluralities of the successful candidates ranged from 4 to 8,000.
