

BUSCH TO MEET JOE MEMSIC NOW

Busch Defeated Jack Renz by Securing Two Falls at the Natorium Last Night—Joe Memsic Issues Challenge and Will Wrestle Monday

That Jack Renz, a local plumber and in years gone by one of the best Cornish style wrestlers in the country, could "come back" sufficiently to give an excellent idea of the man he at one time must have been, if not enough to defeat a present day athlete who is in training all the time, was fully demonstrated last night at the Natorium, when he and Carl Busch held a catch-as-catch-can debate which resulted in the big German's securing two falls from Renz. The match, although after the first fall somewhat one-sided, was the prettiest yet seen at the Nat, and more than once during the periods of wrestling, Renz displayed some of his old time skill by securing holds upon the Dutchman, which, had it not been for his great strength, would have caused him to flatten out.

The bout resulted in Busch securing the first fall in eight minutes and the second in another 14 minutes. When the bout was over it was seen that Renz, who has been out of training for several years, had only kept going during the latter part of the battle by sheer determination, his wind and stamina having by this time been almost all used up. As the result of the battle, Joe Memsic, the local heavyweight, who challenged the winner of the go to meet him Monday night, winner take all, will meet Busch on that date at the Natorium. Friends of the big policeman have posted a \$50 side bet with the German that Memsic can take the honors in the encounter. Memsic weighs 255 pounds and Busch 160.

Coy Watson, 147 pounds, won the preliminary last night by securing two falls from another local boy. Watson's adversary was considerably heavier than he. This makes the second bout that Watson has won during the past two weeks, and at each he has demonstrated that he has everything at his command which with proper training will make him a headliner in his class.

L. Walter Dyrreborg refereed last night's match and Frankie Edwards, a former ring favorite, acted as time-keeper.

A large number of ladies witnessed the two bouts.

Rate War Starts.

VICTORIA, B. C., March 10.—The anticipated rate war on the North Pacific has begun. The Blue Funnel line is sending communications to shippers today announcing that the rate on flour has been cut from \$1 to \$2 per ton from Puget Sound ports to the Orient. A cut in wheat rates is also announced. It is said by shipping men that the rate on flour will go lower before long. Advices from the sound state that it is held there that the Nippon Yusen Kaisha is responsible for the rate war by a system of rebates. The Osaka Shosen Kaisha, who lines have not announced a cut as yet.

MARKET STILL AWAITS GREENS

Prospects for Early Display of Spring Vegetables Increases—Onions and Radishes Already on Display But Not in Big Quantities.

With the advent of the summer weather the early display of local produce market is daily looked for. The California market has contributed little or nothing this spring as the cost of importing early delicacies from there is too great to warrant the undertaking. Green onions, about the first of the greens to appear on the stands, will probably be brought in for sale within the next week in quantities. They are already a feature as are radishes, but not in such quantities as warrant their sale at a low price.

Bring \$1.50 a Box f. o. b. Medford—Winesaps are Sold at \$2—Buyers are Scorning Cold Storage Fruit Seeking it Direct from Orchards.

The Northwest Fruit Exchange, under date of March 8, says: In our last bulletin we published the sale of two cars from Medford, Oregon, at quite high prices. We give hereunder sales of three more cars from the same district, the five cars comprising a block of fruit from the orchard of one of the officers of the Rogue River Fruit and Produce association.

PFE 2924, from Crater Lake Junction (Medford, Or.), March 2: 229 3 1-2 tier, 491 4 1/2 tier fancy Ben Davis, at \$1.50 f. o. b. shipping point, to a buyer in Iowa.

PFE 4585, from Crater Lake Junction (Medford, Or.), March 3: 542 fancy Walbridge, \$1.50; 178 choice Walbridge at \$1.25, f. o. b. shipping point, to a buyer in Missouri.

PFE 6784, from Crater Lake Junction (Medford, Or.), March 4: 209 choice Walbridge, 170 choice Ben Davis at \$1.25; 350 fancy Ben Davis, 43 fancy Lauvers, at \$1.50; 15 4 1-2 and 5-tier fancy Winesaps, at \$2.00; the balance of the car being mostly 4 1-2 tier, all f. o. b. shipping point, to a buyer in Missouri.

There is an exceedingly heavy demand for apples which can be shipped from producing points on the through rate. The peculiarity of the market is that the trade seem willing to pay very high prices for such offerings, but when offered cold storage stock from some eastern point, even though the final cost is the same, they appear to be much less willing to purchase.

This illustrates the exceeding importance to the industry not only of storage in transit rates, but also of adequate holding warehouses at the different producing stations. The exchange has been fighting hard for the restoration of the storage in transit rate, and earnestly desires the active support of the local associations everywhere. Remember, this privilege is vital to the welfare of the industry, and it is the duty of every shipper to put his shoulder to the wheel and lend his assistance to the work being done by his organization in a matter affecting him in dollars and cents.

In passing, the exchange wishes to say that it is again completely sold out of all cars listed for shipment from the northwest and wants to hear immediately from shippers having fruit on hand unsold, as we believe that the market is very near, if not quite, at its best. Strawberries are beginning to occupy the attention of the jobbers in the markets, and while the receipts of this class of fruit are yet quite light, they will get heavier from now on, and we believe that now is the time to sell apples generally speaking. The exchange is finding it necessary to refuse orders for lack of fruit. Shippers should therefore lose no time in listing their holdings with the exchange.
