

### ENGLISH HOUSE HAS ADJOURNED

Stormy Session of 19 Hours Duration Marks Close—Conservatives Offered to Eject Irish Members for Interrupting Speeches.

LONDON, March 10.—After a stormy session of 19 hours' duration in the course of which fistcuffs were narrowly averted, the house of commons adjourned at 9:55 a. m. today.

The climax came when the conservatives offered to assist the speaker in ejecting Irish members for interrupting speeches. The Irish members challenged their opponents to use force and after a wordy conflict the conservatives abandoned the scheme.

Winston Churchill led the administration forces in the absence of Premier Asquith and Chancellor Lloyd George. By adopting cloture Churchill forced the passage of many clauses in the revenue bill, although the conservatives denounced him as a usurper. The bill was still under consideration at adjournment.

### Orators to Orate Tonight.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Feb. 10.—The Inter Collegiate Oratorical contest between the seven colleges of the state will be held tonight, Friday March 10, at the University of Oregon. This is the only occasion on which the state colleges get together and is considered as an event of some importance, each college sending eight delegates beside the orator, and these are usually accompanied by a large following of their fellow students. These visitors will be entertained at the various club houses.

The colleges represented are: Willamette University, Pacific College, University of Oregon, Albany College, McMinnville College, Pacific University, Oregon Agricultural College.

### West Denies Coercion.

SALEM, Ore., March 10.—"In vetoing the good roads bill I used my own best judgment," said Governor West, today, referring to the statement made by John H. Albert, of Salem, alleging that the measure lost by treachery.

The governor intimated that he was not unduly influenced by information brought by him from the Oregon Good Roads association committee, and that he gave the bills only his personal consideration in affixing his veto to the four which were discarded.

### WOULD "ARBITRATE" MURDER OF CHILD

ALBANY, N. Y., March 10.—If District Attorney Sanford will consent to a verdict of manslaughter, the Melber murder trial will come to an end. It was said today that Sanford was willing to agree to a verdict of second degree murder provided a life sentence accompanied it. Mrs. Melber is accused of having poisoned her little boy in a swamp near here.

### Negro Amuck, Kills Six.

BOWLING GREEN, Kentucky, March 10.—The killing of six persons in the mountains of Hart County by "Bud" Massey, a negro, was reported here today. Among the killed was a deputy sheriff who attempted to arrest Massey. Five others were members of the same family, of whom two more were seriously wounded.

### Patrol River With Sand Bags.

VISALIA, Cal., March 10.—Recent cessation of rain of the mountains above Visalia caused St. Johns river to fall two feet today. Reports of renewed rain today gave rise to the fear that the river would rise again and the levees are being patrolled by sandbag crews.

### SOLOON STRIKES AT HAREM SKIRT

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 10.—Harem and hobble skirts are the subject of a bill presented in the house by Representative Murphy of Chicago. Hobbles measuring less than one and one-half yards are prohibited. An absolute ban is placed on the harem skirt by the bill, which prohibits any woman appearing in public in such garb. The penalty for violating the proposed law is a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50 for each and every offense.

### TOWN WIPED OUT BY EXPLOSION

Pleasant Prairie Off the Map—150 Tons of Dynamite Explode—Two Lives Lost—Over Million and Half is Damage.

KENOSHSA, Wis., March 10.—The little city of Pleasant Prairie is off the map today as the result of the explosion yesterday at 150 tons of dynamite at the plant of the Dupont Denemours Powder Company, in which two lives were lost. Not a building was left standing. The great force of the explosion that the entire region from Cleveland, O. to Clinton, Iowa, was badly shaken. The damage to the powder plant, other buildings at Pleasant Prairie and to contiguous territory is estimated at \$1,500,000. Fortunately the plant was closed down at the time and only eighteen men were at work. These escaped with minor injuries except Engineer Joseph Flynn who was blown to atoms and a man who has not been identified, who was killed.

The cause of the explosion is undetermined.

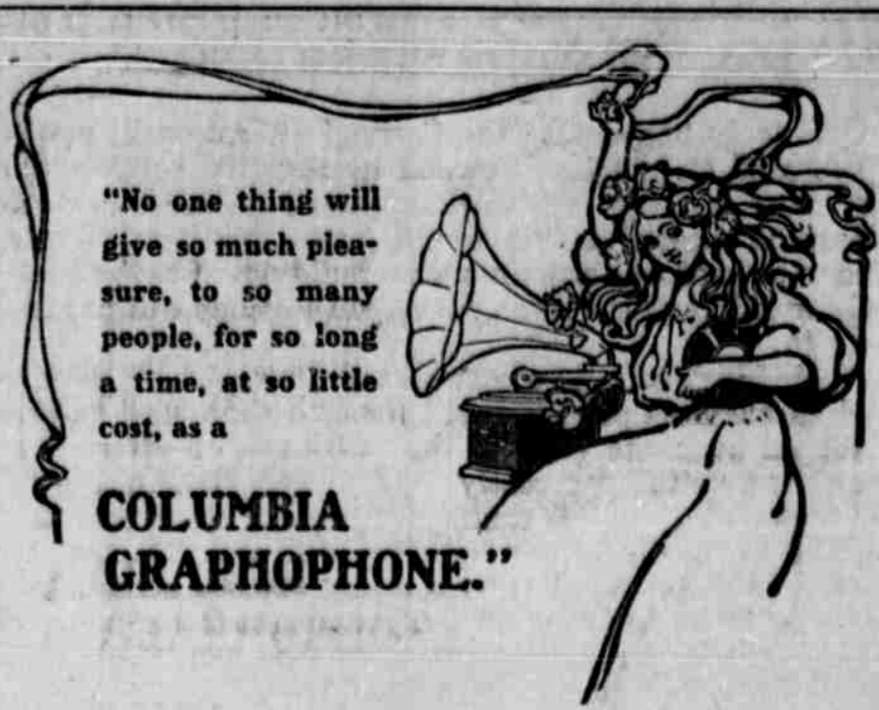
