 The many friends of John Ashpoie and wife are glad to see them among us again. Mr. Ashpole has been greatly improved in health by his trip to Southern California.

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

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
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BUICK WINNER AT NEW ORLEANS

NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 26.—Burman, in his Buick Torpedo, won all four events in which he was entered today, and his daring drives was the feature of Mardi Gras speed carnival races. In the one hour race Burman lost almost a minute in the getaway, but made the first 20 miles in 20:18. Summary:
 Ten miles for cars of class C, with piston displacement under class E of 301-600 cubic inches—Won by Burman (Buick); J. Aitken (National), second. Time, 10:04.
 Five miles free for all cars—Won by Burman (Buick); Caleb Bragg (Fiat Cyclone), second. Time, 4:50.00.
 Five miles trophy event, open by invitation only under class E—Won by Fritch (Buick); time, 5:14.43. Only one car finished, an accident putting Radcliffe (Knox) out of the race.
 Nine miles handicap, free for all—Won by Burman, scratch, (Buick); A. J. Maisonsville (Corbin), second. Time, 9:44.
 One hour race for class C cars not exceeding 600 cubic inches—Won by Burman (Buick); distance, 57 miles.

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
