DENYS THAT DIAZ IS SORE AT UNITED STATES FOR RECENT ACTIVITY

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 13.—Denying that Diaz really resents any plan for intervention by the United States in the Mexican troubles, the revolutionary leaders here today issued the following statement:

"We believe, in spite of official statement to the contrary, that Diaz would welcome intervention. They will have to resort to trickery to get it, and must deliberately attack an American citizen in Mexico. It is possible and probable that Diaz will see that this is done and then declare that the revolutionists made the attack. We are on the lookout for such trickery.

HAS PLACE FOR CITY GARBAGE

Mayor Finds Two Men Who Will Contract to Despose of it—Will Be Hauled Some Distance and Dumped—

It is highly probable that the garbage question which has been the bane of more than one city administration in this city will be satisfactorily disposed of during the next few days, as Mayor W. H. Canon has a deal on whereby the garbage of the city will be collected and disposed of.

For some time the mayor has been seeking some way out of the dilemma. He has succeeded in finding two men who reside about two miles from Medford who have 20 acres of creek bottom which is not near any habitation where garbage can be dumped. They are ready to enter into a contract with the city for hauling it away and disposing of it.

FOUR ARE AFTER ENGINEER'S JOB

MISS PICKENS PASSES AWAY

Jackson County Girl Dies Suddenly Leaving Large Circle of Friends—Was Born Near Table Rock Twenty Four Years Ago.

Miss Dorothy Pickens, a Jackson county girl, who has resided in Medford for many years, passed away at her home Sunday morning between one and two o'clock. The funeral will be held at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday from the residence at 219 South Central avenue.

The death of Miss Pickens came as a great shock to her many friends throughout the city and country. Saturday apparently well, she attended to her duties in the offices of the Mail Tribune, where she was employed, and left for home without making any reference to an illness. She was stricken about nine o'clock in the evening and died after a few hours of great suffering, hemorrhage of the lungs causing death.

Miss Pickens was born at Table Rock September 5, 1887 and was 24 years of age. Her life was spent in Jackson county where she leaves a large circle of friends. She is survived by her parents who reside in Siskiyou county and by three sisters and two brothers.

For years Miss Pickens has been connected with the Mail Tribune and its predecessors, having first taken up newspaper work under Charles Nickell the pioneer newspaper man of Southern Oregon, working as compositor and mail clerk. She was widely known and popular among acquaintances.
