

DEMAND FOR APPLES GOOD

Ben Davis Bring \$1.60 a Box f. o. b. Orchard—Gano Bring \$1.75—Newtown Seconds Brings \$1.40 a Box at Ashland.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange issue the following market bulletin: Portland, Or., March 11.—The demand for apples is considerably in excess of the supply, and consequently prices for good fruit in good condition are advancing steadily.

In our judgment, the market is about at the highest level for the season, with the exception perhaps of Newtowns, which will probably reach a still higher level next month, for such fruit as holds up in first-class condition.

The exchange wishes to call attention to the following incident, which serves to indicate the need for marketing service such as it is rendering. Under date of March 9 it has a letter from the Ashland Fruit and Produce association, Ashland, Or., as follows:

"There is a car of second Newtowns here which are sound and in good condition. They will average about 163 to the box, some larger and some smaller. Party wants \$1 g. o. b. Ashland, Or."

This letter was received yesterday, and today we are wiring an order to the Ashland association for this car at \$1.40 per box f. o. b., which is 40c per box more than the grower asked, or a difference of \$2.40 on a minimum car. Values are based on the law of supply and demand, the operations of which are not always understood by local shippers whose view point is necessarily limited.

The point is that no man, no matter how capable, can handle the many problems of production and preparation for the market and at the same time handle the marketing end efficiently.
