## 300 REGULARS AT TIA JUANA

Famous Eighth Mexican Regiment Veterans of Yaqui Wars, Arrive to Garrison Border Town—No Battle in Sight Yet.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 15.—With 300 Mexican regulars expected at Tia Juana from Ensenada, General Tasker H. Bliss, commanding the United States army forces here, today is all ready for any eventualities that may develop, and has strengthened the American force at the border town by Company B of the Eighth regiment, which, reporting to Captain Evans there, will be in a position to safeguard American interests.

That the coming of the Mexican regulars to Tia Juana will have no effect on conditions there further than to render them more secure to property is the opinion of General Bliss, who is going ahead with the selection of a site for the maneuvers, which, he declares, is the object of the mobilization here. The only possibility of trouble, he asserts, is on the Mexican side, where the Eusebiana contingent of federals may come into conflict with a small rebel band at Tecarte unless the latter take to the hills at news of the overpowering force opposed to them.

The 300 men coming to Tia Juana are of the famous Eighth Mexican regiment, which has for years been active in the Yaqui wars. The command late last night passed LaMuro 35 miles south of Tia Juana, and is expected to reach the border not later than noon today. Another contingent of 150 men will follow soon.

There has been no sign of activity so far among the naval force here. Admiral Thomas' squadron of cruisers are at anchor outside the harbor off Coronado Beach, and the destroyers, torpedo boats, submarines and the gunboat Buffalo are moored in the inner harbor.

Many new buildings at the mine are to be erected and development work undertaken on a large scale. A tow-foot vein has been struck which assays \$16 gold a ton. Prospects are bright indeed for the new company.
