

APPLE PRICES AT LIVERPOOL

Oregon Newtowns Top California and Washington in Price—Increase in Shipments Over Week Ago—Tasmania Apples Due.

Sgobel & Day issue the following bulletin:

New York March 11.—Cable from L. Connolly & Co. of Liverpool reports that the market there yesterday, Friday, stood as follows:

Newtowns—Watsonville, 4 tiers, 8s to 8s 9d, 4 1-3 tiers, 8s 6d; Washington, 8s 6d to 6s 9d; Oregon, 8s 6d to 10s 6d.

Ben Davis—Oregon, 8s to 8s 5d. They say that quotations for the Watsonville apples are for those in pretty good shape, and that the Washington Newtowns were in bad condition.

No cable from London yesterday. The exports this week from here are about as follows:

Liverpool—Carolina, 7000; Battle, 5000—12,000.

London—St. Paul, 6400.

Glasgow—Furness, 1600.

Continent—Two boats, 2000.

Total above three ports, 22,000.

This is an increase over last week's shipment.

At auction yesterday one car of Watsonville 4-tier Newtowns good stock sold from \$1.60 to \$1.65.

At private sale the quotations in our last cover, but we know of some sales of Spitzenbergs from a prominent Oregon point, large size, rather poor shape, sold \$1, \$-.25 and \$1.40 per box. Supplies of this latter are about finished.

Advices from London say that the arrivals of apples from Tasmania there, due between April 1 and July 1, are expected to be about 650,000 boxes and it is said that some may come to New York.

It will interest some of our northwestern prune friends to know that we sold a carload of dried prunes from Idaho this week, bulk, were of good size and made 10 3-4 to 11 3-4c, very small sizes around 9 1-3c. We also have a carload of evaporated apples from the same point for which we expect to get around 12c a pound.

TEN MILLION DOLLAR STEEL PLANT AT SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Wash., March 17.—According to a statement today by James A. Moore, president of the Western Steel corporation, more than \$10,000,000 will be invested in the company's steel plants near Seattle by English capitalists in the immediate future. This money will be used, Moore says, in extending operations in the steel mills at Irondale and New Westminster, B. C. The statement from Moore was received here by cable, his assistants making the big deal public today.

HAFER CONTRACTS FOR MUCH WOOD

New Fuel Company Lets Contract for 10,000 Cords of Wood—Must Be Cut at Not Less Than One Thousand Cords a Month.

Edgar S. Hafer, manager of the Crater Lake Fuel company, Thursday afternoon let a contract to Peter Francis for the cutting of 10,000 cords of wood on the tract of timber owned by the Crater Lake Lumber company, of which company Mr. Hafer is also the manager. Mr. Francis is to commence work at once and must cut not less than 1000 cords of wood a month.

Since Mr. Hafer announced the formation of the new fuel company he has been making rapid progress. When the Pacific & Eastern begins running trains from Butte Falls, which Chief Engineer Gerig states will be at the first of the month, the new fuel company will be in readiness to deliver wood in Medford. Already several large contracts have been secured.

During the past winter Medford residents have been forced to pay from \$9 to \$12 a cord for wood. Mr. Hafer states that his company will greatly reduce this. The wood for the most part has been shipped in from northern points, and Medford has lost the benefit of the payroll, whereas with the new company in operation the payroll will be of benefit to this city.

During the past two days scores of citizens of the city have gone to Mr. Hafer and expressed their appreciation of his new move.
