Col. Tou Velle Receives Word That Carload Left Factory March First—All Models Are New and Clang and Promise to Become Great Favorites.

## WOLGAST TO FIGHT MORAN

Promotor Coffroth Arranges Match for July Fourth, Twenty Rounds, at San Francisco—Wolgast Also to Meet Frankie Burns.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 18.—Promotor James W. Coffroth of San Francisco announced today that he had matched Ad Wolgast to meet Owen Moran in a battle for the world's lightweight championship, scheduled to go 20 rounds, in San Francisco on July 4.

For this match Wolgast is guaranteed \$12,500.

Coffroth also signed Wolgast to meet Frankie Burns in San Francisco in a 20-round bout the last week in May. For the Burns fight Wolgast is to receive \$7500.

In both matches Wolgast has the privilege of taking 40 per cent of the gross receipts.

He coached the freshmen team at Syracuse one season and has turned out winning teams from Dubois and Lincoln high school.

About 40 men are out for baseball and among the candidates is a lot of likely material. Among the new men trying for a position in the pitching department are Houck of Portland and Pete of Sumpter. Both are promising players and will likely be valuable additions to the team.

## WOLGAST WINS OVER MEMSIC

Champion Lightweight Successfully Defends His Title Against Los Angeles Contestant—Outclasses Opponent From Start—Gets Decision

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 18.—Champion Ad Wolgast successfully defended his title against George Memsic of Los Angeles Friday afternoon. The bout ended rather unexpectedly, but Memsic was thoroughly beaten at the time Referee Eytan waived Wolgast to his corner in the ninth round.

Memsic's nose was fractured during the fifth round by a hard right swing and he did not appear to show much steam after this round. The result clearly proves that Wolgast is Memsic's master. He was his superior at every angle of the art and after the first round the result was never in doubt.

The champion's infighting was a revelation and his wicked left and right swings reached vulnerable parts of his adversary's anatomy.

Both the principals in the main event weighed in a 3'clock and were within the requisite 133 pounds. Memsic barely moved the beam at 133 pounds. Wolgast tipped it at 130.

### Round One.

The men entered and immediately went into a clinch. Wolgast forced Memsic back to the ropes and landed two hard rights to the stomach. They went at it hammer and tongs, and Memsic soot a hard right to the face. He repeated a moment later. Wolgast tore after his man and landed two hard lefts and a right to the stomach. They sparred and Wolgast sent his right to the head. Memsic wrestled Wolgast to the floor and was hissed by the crowd. Wolgast rose immediately and took a left to the face. They clinched and Wolgast sent his right to the chin. Wolgast sent a left to the face and they were clinched when the gong rang Wolgast's round.

### Round Two.

Memsic sent straight left to the face and they clinched. Memsic assumed rough tactics and used his weight in the clinches. Wolgast sent an overhand left to the face and repeated a moment later, drawing first blood from Memsic's nose. Wolgast showed up well in the fighting. He sent his left hard to the jaw. Memsic landed a right swing to the kidneys and shot three long range lefts to Wolgast's right eye. They clinched and Wolgast sent two hard rights to the head. Memsic swung a hard right to the head and staggered Wolgast. Wolgast came back with a right to the face and a left to the stomach. They were clinched at the bell. Memsic had slight shade the best in this round.

### Round Three.

Wolgast rushed from his corner and sent three hard rights to the face and potted Memsic's kidneys in the clinch. Wolgast landed right and left to the head and Memsic was warned for holding. Wolgast sent a light left to the face and took a left to the mouth in return. They squared away and Memsic prodded Ad on the nose with a left. Wolgast abandoned his crouch and fought in an upright position. This was a tame round, with neither having any advantage.

### Round Four.

Memsic swung his left to Wolgast's ear and they clinched. Wolgast swung right and left to the head and left to the stomach. Wolgast sent left to Memsic's nose. Memsic landed left hook to face and they clinched. Wolgast landed left to the stomach and took a hard right to the ear in return. Wolgast punished Memsic in the clinches. Memsic sent left to the ear and avoided a counter. Wolgast landed left lightly on the face and took two hard rights to the body. Even round.

### Round Five.

They sparred and Memsic shot his left to the stomach. Memsic tried a second time, but Wolgast rushed him to the ropes, landing a series of hard left and right smashes which sent Memsic half down. Memsic fought back wildly and Wolgast peppered him and got away without a counter. Wolgast sent hard right and left to jaw and landed a left to the stomach

with blood and went to his corner groggy.

### Round Seven.

Memsic came to the center a little stronger and shot left to the head. They clinched and the champion sent right to Memsic's face and uppercut the Bohemian repeatedly to the face and swung a vicious right to the kidneys, blocking a return. Memsic sent light left to the nose and they clinched. Memsic's face was a pitiable sight. His left eye was closed and his nose broken. Wolgast sent a hard right uppercut to the mouth and rushed his opponent to the ropes. He sent Memsic's head back with a right jab and repeated with a left to the chin. Memsic fought back gamely but seemed unable to do any damage. Wolgast's round.

### Round Eight.

Wolgast met Memsic coming out

of his corner and sent hard right to the body as they closed in. Ad pounded the kidneys in the clinch and sent his left to the face. Memsic landed light left to the face and took two lefts to the nose in return. He appeared a little stronger but could not land an effective punch on the champion. Wolgast again rushed his man to the ropes and sent a series of short arm uppercuts to the face. Wolgast sent left to the eye. Memsic was on the ropes at the bell. Wolgast's round.

### Round Nine.

Wolgast fought carefully and sent his right to the jaw. Wolgast pounded Memsic about the ring. His blows sent Memsic reeling and he landed at will. Memsic was unable to make any defense and the referee stepped between the men and awarded the fight to Wolgast.

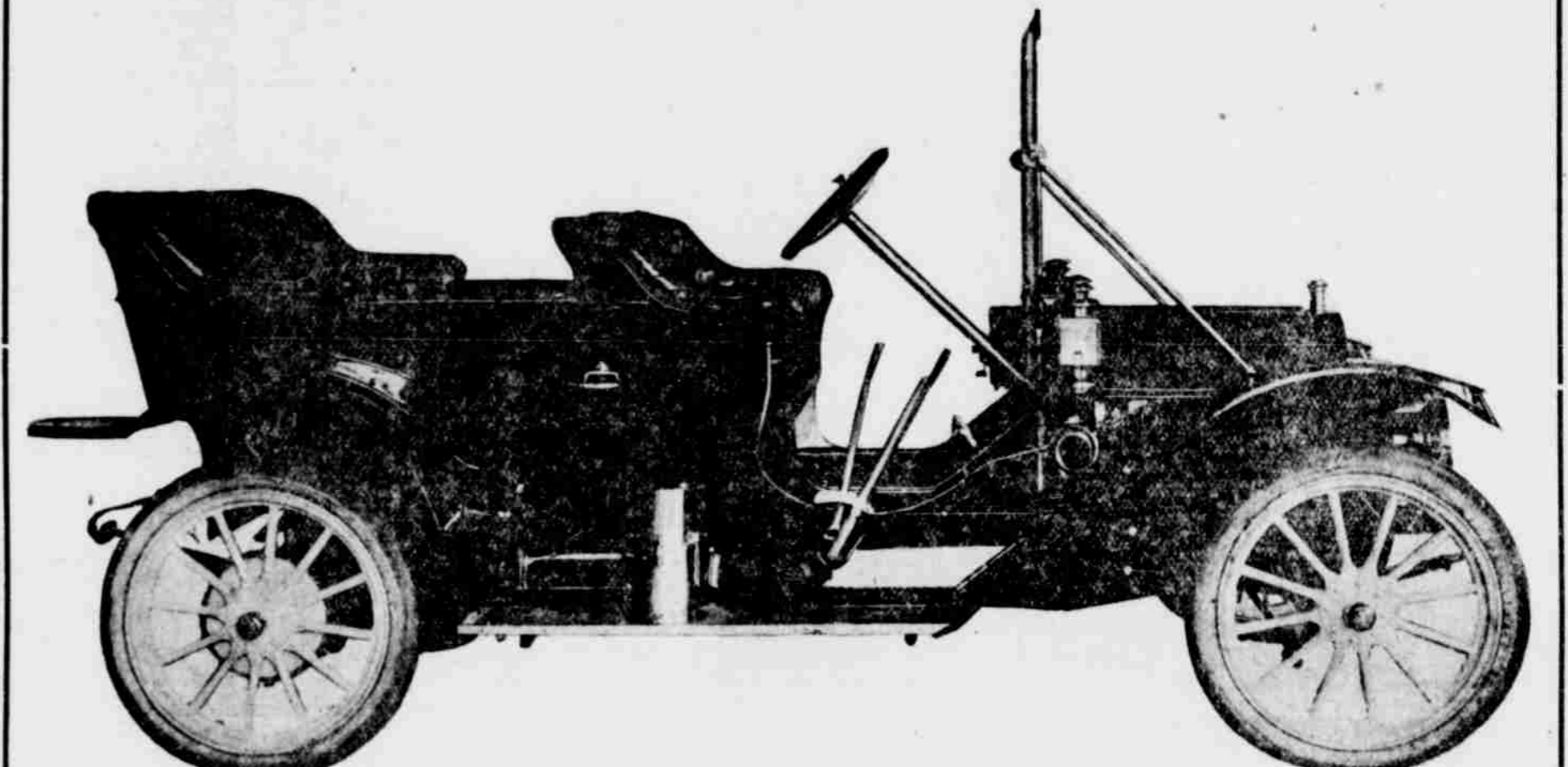

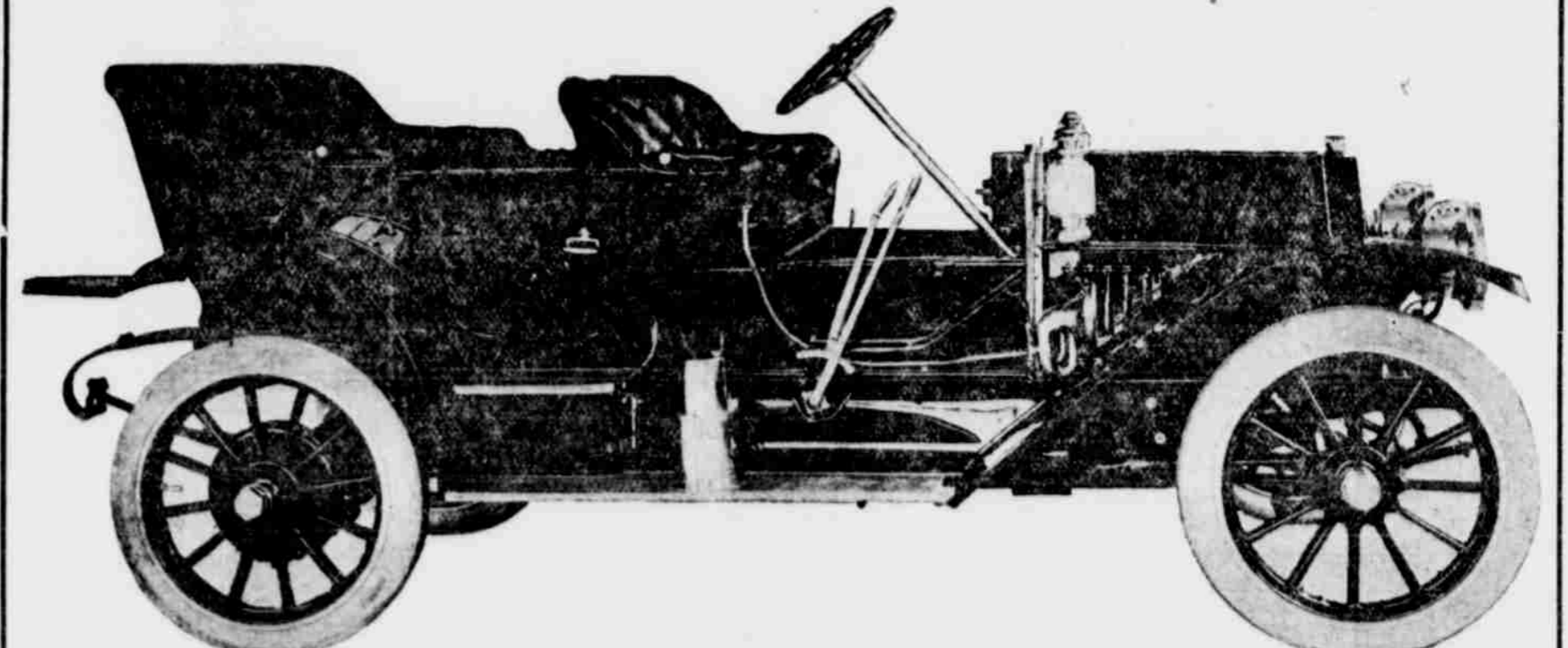

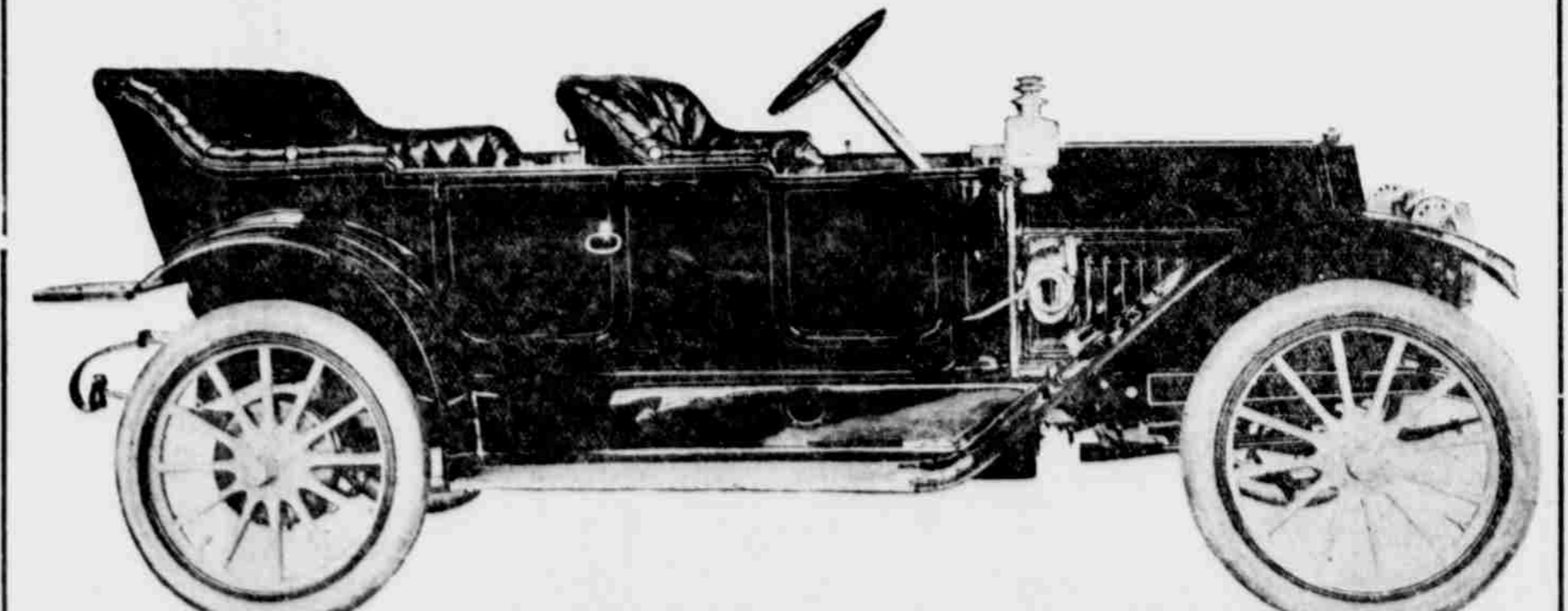
