WAPPENSTEIN'S LIBERTY COSTS HIM \$50,000

SEATTLE, Wash., March 18.—Former Chief of Police Charles Wappenstein is enjoining his liberty under \$50,000 bonds today, \$25,000 more being required by the county authorities last night following a second indictment returned by the grand jury. Like the first indictment against Wappenstein this charges bribery, in having taken \$1,000 from Clarence Gerald and Gideon Tappan and agreeing to permit a noted resort to operate without of police interference. Wappenstein was arrested at his home last night and furnished the extra \$25,000.

SECOND BATTLE PENDING AT TECARTE, MEXICO

SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 18.—Reports early today from Tecarte, Mexico, which town was recaptured by the federals yesterday after a battle in which the rebels lost eight men, fifty horses and twenty-eight rifles, indicated that a second engagement was imminent. Laredo Gonzales, rurals, retiring from a scouting expedition, informed commander Justin Mandieta, of the federal forces, that a new band of rebels, ninety strong, was approaching the rear from the east, and probably would attack the town today in conjunction with the scattered force of about twenty-five of the survivors of yesterday's fight.

FAST STEAMER LINE HAMBURG TO PACIFIC

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 18.—A direct line of fast steamships between Antwerp, Hamburg and London and the Pacific coast will be established by the Kosmos line, according to Director Caesar Wehrhahn, who is in San Francisco today on an inspection tour. He declared the first ship would leave Hamburg in about sixty days and will make the run to this port in two months. At the start there will be a vessel sailing every sixty days.

It is confidently expected that a continuance of the present effective campaign against orchard pests for the next three years will eliminate it entirely.

Eliminates Sliding Scale.
Another marked effect of the operations of the association and one which will be of especial value to buyers, will be the elimination of the varying scale of prices placed upon the same piece of property by different agents. There has been much well-founded complaint in the past, the substantial reason for the existence of the custom being the habit of owners to name a net price on their properties to a number of agents, with the proviso that each agent might get what he could out of the sale of the property for himself above such net return to the owner. The result has been that each agent has fixed a different price on the same

property, and prospective buyers, encountering one agent after another, each one with a different quotation, have been disgusted and discouraged from buying in the valley at all. The facts in cases of this kind have become known to practically everyone in the valley, and it is unnecessary to go into details.

The further advantages and benefits of the association and the exchange to buyers, sellers and brokers, and to the interests of the Rogue River valley, will be made manifest through the practical operations of the next few months, in handling the crowds of home-seekers attracted to the valley by the winter's campaign of advertising. They will be dwelt upon at length by the speakers at a smoker to be given by the association in the Commercial club rooms next Wednesday evening. Invitations to the smoker will be extended to all of the real estate men in the city and vicinity, without regard to membership in the association, and also to the large owners of city and country property, and to others outside of these classes who are interested in the business affairs and prosperity of Medford and the valley.

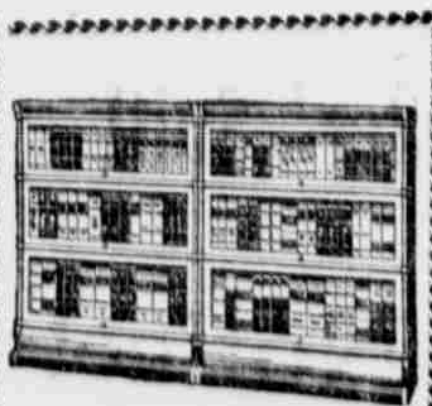
