court agreeing to furnish additional funds necessary to complete the grade according to plans, and

"Whereas, Colonel Frank H. Ray and the four banks of Medford have agreed to underwrite the popular subscriptions made to the Crater lake highway fund, by advancing to the county court of Jackson county \$10,000, taking as security the subscriptions due, and naming as trustee for the said underwriters, F. H. Merrick therefore,

"Be it resolved: That the Crater lake highway commission of the Medford Commercial club hereby accept the offer of the county court is complete the highway, and the offer of the underwriters to advance the \$10,000 needed for construction and authorizes its president, secretary, and treasurer to turn over to F. E. Merrick, trustee for the underwriters, with full power to collect for the purpose of reimbursing the underwriters, the subscriptions made to the Crater lake highway fund, the surplus remaining, after the underwriters have been reimbursed, to be returned to the commission for expenditure on other portions of the road."

The underwriting is done on the basis of one-third by Colonel Ray two-thirds by the four banks. For the \$10,000 advanced, \$15,000 in unpaid subscriptions is security, most of which are not due until June 1.

Colonel Ray offered the county the use of two heavy road rollers to be used as soon as needed, and the road will be ready for traffic by June 1. Advertising the trip to the lake can be done at once.

COL. RAY CUTS LIGHT OFFER

Offers to Furnish Cluster Lights With Juice at \$1.80 a Month Per Cluster—Is Just Half of Previous Amount Asked.

Colonel Frank H. Ray of New York city, owner of the Rogue River Electric company, appeared before the city council, which met in special session this morning, and, after discussing the cluster light proposition with them, voluntarily cut the price of maintenance for cluster lights in half.

As furnished by the company before his arrival from New York, Colonel Ray states that he would like to see the city install cluster lights and is willing to contract with them at the rate of \$1.80 a month per cluster.

The city council took no action in the matter this morning, but have his latest proposition under consideration. It is understood that the council prefers a five-year contract instead of one for ten years, but Colonel Ray feels that in cutting the regular price in half that he is making a big concession.

The residents of the city all express themselves in favor of installing the cluster lights on Seventh street, as it would greatly enhance the beauty of the city. It is believed that an understanding will be reached ere long.

GRANITE FOR WALKS ARRIVES

First Four Carloads of Material for Use in Park, Given to Ladies of Greater Medford Club, is on Hand—Fifteen Carloads Are to Arrive

The first four loads of granite sand for the parks was received Monday afternoon. This is the first shipment of a gift of 15 loads, given to the ladies of the Greater Medford club for park walks by the Southern Pacific railroad. The cars were shipped over the Southern Pacific free of charge and Mr. Barnum of the Rogue River Valley railroad hauled them free of charge to the park. In order to do this, Barnum hauled freight on Sunday to Jacksonville so that the sand cars could be handled Monday.

The city donated half of the laborers to unload the cars, the club hiring the other half.

Park Foreman Williams immediately put a force of men to distributing the sand on the walks of the old park and the new park will have its granite walks laid next week.

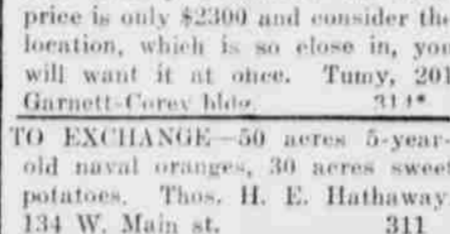

NEW BUILDING ORDINANCE PLAN

City Council Listens to Plea of F. H. Cowles for Better Arranged Fire Escapes—He is Named a Member of the Committee to Frame It.

Following an address of some length by F. H. Cowles at the council meeting Tuesday evening, Mayor Canon called attention to the fact that Medford needs a new building ordinance and instructed the building committee to prepare one. Mr. Cowles was appointed a member of the committee at the suggestion of W. W. Elfert.

Mr. Cowles pleaded that no more fire escapes of the present type in use in Medford be allowed. He reviewed conditions at other cities and drew conclusions as to what would happen here in case of a conflagration, which he declared must come sooner or later. He exhibited a number of pictures depicting scenes at holocausts in America and foreign countries and made an appeal for the firemen and residents who in future would be caught in blazing buildings. He favored a type of escape that would not allow of congestion and falling.
