

THIRTEEN BOES GIVEN TIE PASS

Police Clean Out City—Warehouses Have Been Plied of Late and Men Thought Responsible Are Told to Leave for Other Sections.

Thirteen hoboes were given a tie pass out of Medford yesterday by the local police. Constable Singler had been notified that hoboes had been breaking into the warehouses and stealing fruit and vegetables. He investigated and 13 men ran out of one of the warehouses. The last seen of them were "hiking it" fast to Ashland. Upon investigation it was found that they had broken open boxes and feasted on Rogue river apples and had enjoyed the fruit as was testified by the cores of apples that covered the floor.

DAVID H. MOFFATT LAID AT REST

Thousands of Coloradans View His Body as It Lay in State in Capitol—Banks Close and Railroad Ceases Operation.

DENVER, Col., March 23.—David Moffat, the railroad builder, was privately buried here this afternoon in a vault in Fairmont cemetery. Thousands viewed his body this morning as it lay in state in the capital and during the funeral this afternoon all street cars, power houses, mills and factories in Denver were still for five minutes as a mark of respect to his memory. All the banks were closed and trains on the Moffat railroad and on the Denver and Rio Grande ceased operation during the obsequies.

LIGHT FRANCHISE GRANTED HARMON

Eagle Point Council Acts—Thirty Days Are Given to Consider the Proposition Then They Must Begin to Solicit Consumers.

(By A. C. Howlett.) Last Saturday night our city dad granted to W. W. Harmon and associates a franchise for an electric light and power plant for a period of 50 years. The terms are that the aforesaid parties are to have 30 days to consider the proposition and must begin to solicit patronage at that time and as soon as 500 sixteen candle power lights are subscribed they must begin construction within 30 days thereafter and be ready to supply electricity within six months. There are some of the old croakers that are complaining about giving away such a valuable franchise but they don't stop to think what a benefit it will be to the town. And for men to invest the amount of capital that is necessary to put in such a plant as that, especially in a town that in an election where the question at issue was saloon or no saloon, could only find 53 voters, and several of them were transient, shows a lack of the progressiveness of some of the Medford boosters. They have also secured the services of Civil Engineer Tee and his helpers to set the stakes for grading the streets and have actually commenced to grade them in the part of town next to the depot, something greatly needed.
