Speeches were made by several prominent men, Judge Colvig being the first speaker, and was introduced by President Garner.

Secretary Malboeuf of the Commercial club followed and gave an interesting talk on both institutions and their duties. Later he gave some interesting facts about the growth of the valley and new possibilities of production.

J. M. Root followed and in his speech, which won instant applause, he pleaded for the abandonment of East and West Side rivalry and in its place a rivalry for a Greater Medford.

Kirby S. Miller and Professor O'Gara spoke on their work and many interesting features were presented. Irving Worthington followed and in his address he urged and gave facts supporting his claim, that more irrigation be done in the dry or desert lands and that this work be promoted to its fullest extent and possibilities.

WOMEN ALL VOTE "NO" TREATING ORDINANCE

TACOMA, Wash., March 23.—An analysis of the voting in the elections yesterday shows that the society women and those in the tenderloin district voted almost solidly against the ordinance against treating and two wards where the greater part of the voters are working men returned large majorities for the ordinance.

In the so-called "silk-stocking" ward of the city the ordinance was snowed under, the society women turning out in full force and working vigorously for the defeat of the measure. In the Second ward, which takes in the saloon and red light district, the vote was almost two to one against the ordinance. The Fifth ward, which is the stronghold of the laboring class, returned 2439 for the ordinance and 936 against. It is estimated that the majority of the women registered cast their votes.

WOMEN TO GIVE KANSAS TOWN THOROUGH CLEANING

HUNNEWELL, Kan., March 23.—"To arms, sisters; it is up to us to give this town a thorough cleaning." This was the slogan today of the women of Hunnewell, who believe the men are running the city as a "wide open" town, and have decided to take a hand in municipal affairs. At a caucus held yesterday Mrs. J. E. Wilson was nominated for mayor and Mrs. G. A. Osborne for police magistrate. A vigorous campaign is planned.

CROP PROSPECTS ARE EXCELLENT

Every Disease is Wiped Out and Trees Are Heavily Set With Blossoms—Inspectors Soon to Leave for Outlying Districts in County.

"Fruit conditions in the Rogue river valley were never so good as at the present time," states Professor O'Gara. "The diseases and blight are practically all wiped out on the floor of the valley and the trees are going to bear a record harvest of apples."

"The Gore orchard I visited last year. Every orchard I visited Wednesday is in the same condition and I found no traces of disease." The inspectors in a few weeks will go to the extremes of the county, inspecting such districts as Prospect, Brownboro, Butte Falls, and on the California line.

Two years ago, when the study of the codlin moth was taken up and the fight waged against this fruit destroyer, several thousand cocoons were gathered by one man. Now for further study of the life and habits of this insect Professor O'Gara needs cocoons, but he can not get a needed supply, and a cocoon is rarer than a gold nugget.

Buried Man May Live.

COLUMBUS, O., March 23.—Faint tapping in the collapsed shaft of the West mineral mine was heard today and revived the hope that Tom Cheek, who has been imprisoned four days, may be living.

Inspector Gilday and six men are at work trying to rescue Cheek. They expect to find him alive in one of the side entries. Cheek was entombed when an explosion wrecked the mine and killed four men.

O'GARA TO TALK TO LOCAL PUPILS

Will Deliver Lectures on Weather Bureau Work and Explain to Them How Forecasts Are Made—Will Show Them Instruments.

The Medford high school will get the benefit of several lectures on weather bureau work and a lecture on the instruments used and how to test and correct them.

Professor O'Gara has volunteered to give several practical lectures, and will demonstrate with the instruments which were recently installed by the government.

This station is equipped second to none except the main bureau in Oregon. Several of the instruments cost from \$75 to \$200.

When all of the appliances are installed in the local office, the value of the instruments will be close to \$500.

Professor U. S. Collins is heartily in favor of this lecture course, and expressed surprise and gratification when he learned of Mr. O'Gara's offer. He said that dates would be arranged in the near future.
