

MISS CURRY IS LAID AT REST

Sorrowing Friends Pay Last Tribute—Simple Words of Comfort Are Spoken—Classmates Appear in Deep Mourning.

The funeral of Miss Wray Curry was held this afternoon from the late residence on South Central avenue.

A message was received Thursday, stating that John Curry, her father, was seriously ill and unable to travel. The news of her death was a great shock to him as it came so suddenly.

The services at the home were conducted by the Rev. Theodore Matlock of the Christian church. His appreciation was characteristic of the girl, simple, direct, and filled with a tender sweetness. He spoke of her lovable character and of her wonderful personality that instantly won her the friendship of all who met her. He told of a life that furnished each hour some ray of gladness, and the resulting happy, cheerful disposition.

The funeral was one of the largest in the history of this city. Long before the hour of the funeral service friends and schoolmates gathered to take a last look on the loved face and few eyes were dry as the sorrowing friends left the bier.

The coffin was banked with rare and beautiful floral offerings sent in great profusion.

The high school attended in a body and marched to the grave. The junior class of which she was a member appeared in deep mourning.

The pennants of every class in the high school were decorated in mourning and her desk banked with flowers.

Six students of the high school acted as pallbearers, Frank Ray, Don Rader, Walter Merriek, Fletcher Ware, Frederick Heath and Emerson Merriek.

Wray Curry was born in Medford December 22, 1891, and died March 21 at midnight, aged 19 years and 3 months.

She lost her mother at the age of 9 and has lived since with her grandmother.

She was a girl loved by all who met her. A happy, cheerful disposition that tried to make life easier for those about her. She was kindness herself.

Her friends are numbered by the hundreds in Medford and among her schoolmates she was loved and honored. A leader in her class, both in studies and in its social circles. Brilliant in conversation she was popular with all. Her teacher's regret her death deeply. She is survived by two sisters, Miss Ethel and Miss Gladys Curry, an aunt, Miss May Curry, an uncle, John Plymale, and two aunts on her mother's side, Mrs. Horace Nicholson and Mrs. Meade Fox, and her grandmother, Mrs. Jane Plymale.

The body was interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at Medford.

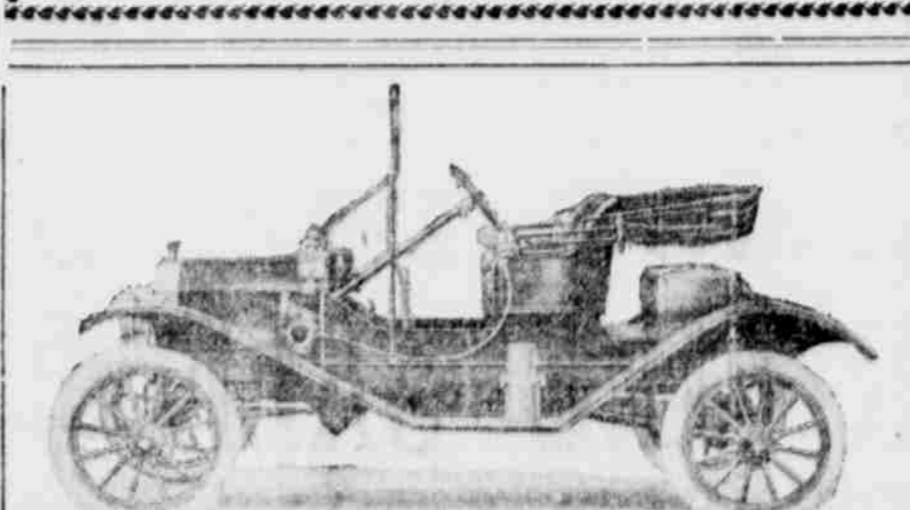

HEAVY BLANKETS FOR UNCLE SAM

Coast Mills Receive Large Orders—Possible Winter Campaign by United States Forces is Forecast—Amount of Order is Half Million.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 24.—Mills at Portland, Salem, San Francisco and Napa, Cal., have received orders from the war department for delivery to the quartermaster at El Paso, Texas, of a quantity of heavy blankets. The amount of the order will be \$500,000, and delivery is to begin as soon as possible.

The blankets will meet with the severest inspection. A test of weather exposure for several months is given. The order, it is believed, foreshadows a possible winter campaign in Mexico.
