JACKSONVILLE IS AN EASY VICTIM

Medford Cleans Her Up to Merry Time of Eleven to Nothing—Local Boys Play Errorless Ball—Burgess Good After He Came to Earth.

Medford, outclassed, outhit, and outgeneraled Jacksonville in everything but errors in the first game of the season, played Sunday. Jacksonville cleaned 9 errors. Medford none. The game was a slaughter. Medford winning 11 to 0.

In the first canto, the young battery, Burgess and Hill seemed nervous. Burgess was unable to locate the plate, walking the first two batters. It looked bad for Medford. Then Burgess settled down, after Wilson flied to Isaac's, which the 'big one' stuffed into his pocket.

With two on bases, Burgess fanned Wilcox and Ennis and the crowd breathed a long sigh of relief. Miles led off for Medford, hitting an easy boundary to Hopkins who shot it over to first, hours ahead of the hummer. McFarren died at the plate. Wilkenson landed on the first delivery of Wilcox, and lined the ball over the fence for a home run circling the bases. Isaac's singled but Horton fanned.

Burgess settled down from then on though he was in a tight box in several cases, he steadied and struck several out. Only one Jacksonville man reached third, while in every inning Medford had men on bases, most of the time with bases full.

The Medford sluggers took to Wilcox and gathered ten runs off him pounding him out of the box in the fourth inning. Wick took his place and allowed three hits and one run. The game showed plainly that Medford, has a line up of heavy hitters. The infield is like a stone wall. The outfield good.

Creves at third is a find. He fielded every ball clean and whips them first on a line. On bases he is easily the best man on the team and is a hard sure batsman. Horton ran bases like a wild man.

Wilkenson is a fixture at first Burgess has a fine assortment of curves and his cross fire is good, but he needs a cool head to hold him down. He aeroplanes two much antics to play all over the field. A little coaching and the south paw will be the mainstay of the team.

Medford used the hunting and hit and run game in the third, and the whole Jacksonville team blew up. When the smoke cleared away four runs had been registered.

The score keeper's book at the end of the game showed that Medford had picked thirteen hits from the Jacksonville's pitchers. Seven men had walked, three bags stolen, no errors.

Jacksonville had cornered four hits off Burgess, four walks and had errored nine times. Medford pulled off two double plays. The first one, being the fastest. Creves smothered a hot liner shot it to Miles who whipped it to Wilkenson an instant before the runner got there. It was the prettiest play of the game.

Burgess struck eight men out. Wilcox struck nine men out. Wick struck two men out. Wilcox had to strike his batter out as his team mates errored time after time at critical moments. Four runs were secured in this way.
