TO CHOOSE PLAN LIBRARY BLD'G

Board Will Meet Tonight—Six Elaborate Sets of Plans Are Offered —One Will Be Chosen and Sent to Carnegie's Secretary.

The library board will meet tonight and select the design and plans for the Carnegie library building.

The board has received six sets of plans from as many architects, among them being several of the most noted in the west. The plans are said to be works of art and the board will have a hard time in making a choice.

The plan selected will be elaborated upon and then sent to Carnegie's secretary, who will approve or reject as the case may be.

The building will cost \$17,000. Three thousand dollars will be expended for equipment.

The building will be of Grecian design and will be of classic finish and will be one story with a basement.

A library room, a stock room and an art room will be on the first floor. A children's room and study room may be provided also. The main reading room will have tables for periodicals and papers.

"Two plans are on foot. One to have the building face the park fountain and on Oakdale. This double entrance building would be the prettiest design by far," said a member of the board.

The building for this plan would have to be built in the center of the park.

The second plan is to have it face Main street.

The new library will be finished by October 1.

The board has decided not to move the present library until the new building is entirely finished.

MANY NEW LAWS IN CALIFORNIA

ple a constitutional amendment providing for the initiative and referendum. Under this proposed amendment referendum election must number not less than 8 per cent of all the votes of all candidates for governor at the last general state election.

Resolution to submit to a vote of the people a constitutional amendment providing for the recall of all elective officers, including the judiciary. Petitioners for a recall election must number not less than twelve per cent of the votes cast for all candidates for governor at the last state election.

Railroad rate bill: extending the powers of the state railroad commission. One indication of the fulfillment of Governor Johnson's promise to "kick the Southern Pacific out of California politics."

The measure provides for physical valuation of railroads and the establishment of rates on that valuation. The powers of the commission to fix and maintain rates are extended.

A resolution to submit to the vote of the people a constitutional amendment that will extend the jurisdiction of the railroad commission to all public utilities corporations. It is known as the public utilities commission amendment.

Board of control bill: Designed to effect more efficient management of public institutions. The measure provides for three members to be appointed by the governor. The board of control will replace the old board of examiners. It is empowered to purchase all supplies for public institutions. Resolution to submit to a vote of the people a constitutional amendment granting suffrage to women.

Full train crew bill: analyzing railroads for failure to carry full crews on all trains.

Amendments to election laws providing for a return to the Australian ballot system by abolishing the party circle. The election of judges and of the state superintendent or public instruction is made non-partisan by the provision that candidates for those offices shall have no political designation on the ballot.

Bill limiting the labor of women to eight hours per day and forty-eight hours per week except in the perishable fruit industry. Violation of this law is made a misdemeanor, punishable by fine or imprisonment.

A bill and a constitutional amendment resolution to shorten the ballot by providing that the state printer and the clerk of the supreme court be appointive by the governor instead of elective as at present.
