RAILROADS GIVEN A FAULTY TIP

Representatives of Four Western Roads Learn That Ohio Militia is to Be Sent to California and Ask for Routing.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, March 29.—Claiming to have been "tipped off" that the entire Ohio militia soon would be sent to California, the passenger agents of four western railroads called upon Adjutant General Weybrecht for the privilege of carrying the troops. They said that the Ohio national guard would be sent to San Antonio.

General Weybrecht declared their statements were news to him and conferred with his staff preparatory to the possible order issuance to proceed to California. He denied that any official notification of such a move had been received by him.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 29.—Denial that the war department intends calling out the militia of any state was given out today at department headquarters.
