Mr. and Mrs. William Morris of Rock Point Have Been Wed Over Half Century—Lived in Jackson County Since 1877.

Mr. and Mrs. William Morris celebrated their 54th wedding anniversary at Rock Point, Jackson county, last Sunday. Mr. Morris married Sarah E. Cook near Cedarville, Dade county, Missouri, March 26, 1857. They crossed the plains to Oregon with mule teams in 1877 and have lived in Jackson county since. They have been the parents of 13 children 10 of whom are living; the grandparents of 30, living, and grand-children of two.

Those at the celebration were R. R. Morris, brother of Mr. Morris; Mrs. J. W. Hays, sister of Mrs. Morris, and her husband; Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Harvey and family, Mrs. W. A. Cooy and family, Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Cook and son, Mrs. Ben Haymond and family, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Morris and family, Mr. and Mrs. James Smith and family, Mr. and Mrs. John Ritter and son, and Alex Morris.

Mr. Morris is a veteran of the civil war, having served with an Arkansas regiment. He is 74 years of age and Mrs. Morris is 70.

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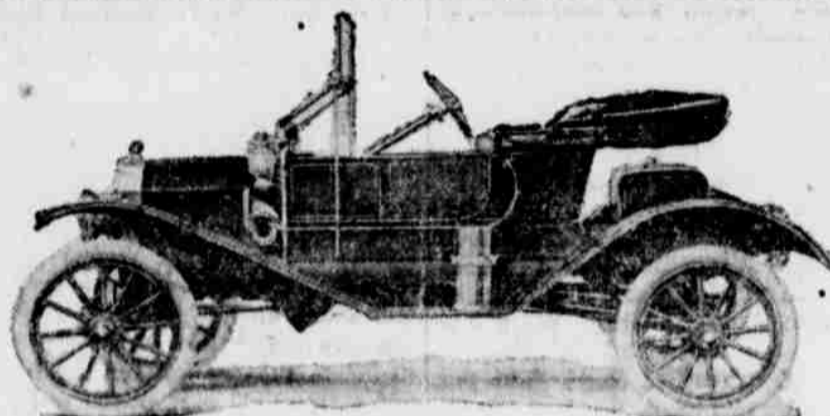
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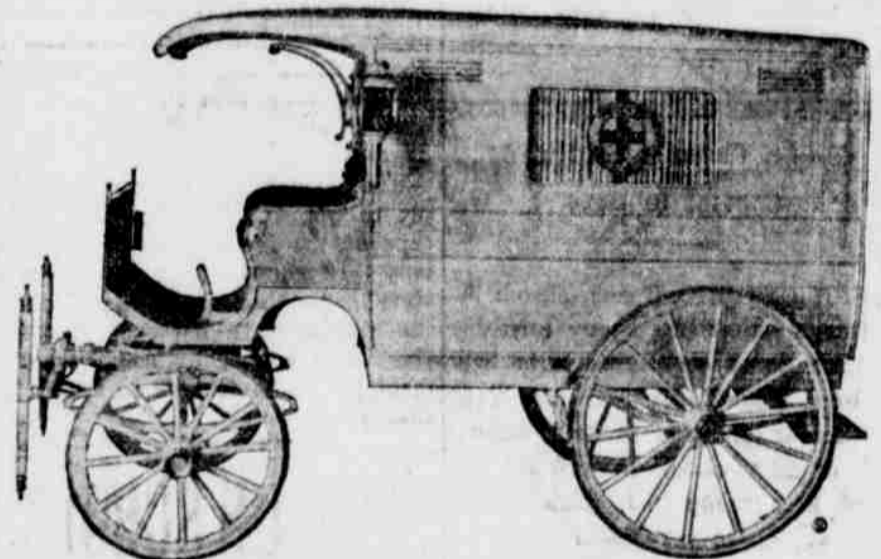
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
