

COI CHARGED BRIBE TAKING

Jack Johnson's Nemesis is Under Arrest—Says Matter Has Been Frimed Up in Order to Get Away With Him.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 31.—Charged with having accepted bribes from autoists for their release after he had arrested them for speeding, Policeman William L. Ceinar, best known to fame as the persistent nemesis of pugilist Jack Johnson, is out here today on \$6000 bail following his arrest by detective acting on instructions from Chief of Police Seymour.

Ceinar, who says the whole affair is "plant," was arrested after Detectives Conlon and Leonhardt had seen him accept an envelope containing \$5 from Oscar G. Killop, a speeder whom Ceinar had threatened with arrest. Ceinar was nabbed after a sharp struggle and before he had time to open the envelope in which is said to have been a bill privately marked by Chief Seymour himself.

Possibility of a big police scandal is seen in entries in Ceinar's notebook, in which different notations of influential speeders being released through "pull," and, sometimes, by the direct orders of his superior officers in the police department.

CRUISERS TO PLAY AT WAR WITH RESERVE

SEATTLE, Wash., March 31.—The six cruisers of the Pacific fleet will be placed at the disposal of the naval militia of Oregon, Washington and California early in July, for practice maneuvers, according to officials at the Bremerton navy yard today.

According to the plans announced there will be extensive maneuvers of the cruiser fleet. Two cruisers will be assigned to each state.

On July 2, the cruisers will be divided into three divisions, arriving at Portland, Seattle and San Francisco and the militia will be assigned to the vessels for duty with the regular crew to learn the routine of life aboard ship. The vessels will also proceed to sea to give the shore men an opportunity to become accustomed to deep sea cruising and its discomforts.

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CLAIMS HE HAS RIGHT TO BEAT HIS WIFE

ST. PAUL, Minn., March 31.—Joseph Traveske of No. 300 Chestnut street, maintained in police court that he has a right to whip his wife whenever he pleases, and defied Judge Hanft to keep him from it.

"I whip her when she 'sass'es me," said Traveske. "I will not promise to quit it."

Judge Hanft was inclined to discharge Traveske if he would promise to stop beating the woman, but Traveske refused. He said that he made \$12 a week, of which she got more than half, and he considered that this gave him a right to strike her when she nagged him.

The man refused to ask for any alimony and said he preferred going to the workhouse to making any promise. Judge Hanft sentenced him to 15 days. Traveske is a laborer, working at the McMillan packing plant.

TALENT MAY GET WATER SYSTEM

Stock Company is Being Organized to Dig Artesian Well and Furnish Pure Water to Residents of Little City to the South.

A movement is on foot in Talent to organize a local stock company in order to raise funds for drilling an artesian well to furnish water for town purposes and to afford adequate fire protection. At present the only supply of water is from the wells, and there is no way to fight fire except by a bucket brigade. As there are two successful artesian wells within a quarter mile of the town there is every reason to believe that an abundant supply of water can be struck within the town limits. A tank will be erected as reservoir and to furnish pressure for fire-fighting purposes.

J. H. Lacy has donated the lot upon which his home stands for the site of the well and will move his house to make room for the well and tank. The house is located on the highest spot in town and is therefore particularly well suited for the well and storage tank. Drilling will probably be started in the near future.
