ASHLAND SUNDAY LAW QUESTIONED

F. W. Moore Appears Before Council and Challenges Validity of Repeal of Ordinance Reopening Sunday Theatres in Neighboring City.

ASHLAND, March 31.—Contending that Saturday's referendum vote was illegal and that the city ordinance closing theatres and places of amusement is still in effect and must remain so, Attorney F. W. Moore, representing the Sunday closing faction, appeared before the city council and challenged the right of the city fathers to declare the Sunday closing ordinance repealed.

In addressing the mayor and council, Mr. Moore declared that the law distinctly provides that all referendum measure must be filled with the city recorder within 10 days after the passage of an ordinance by the council and its approval by the mayor.

"This is insisted upon by the law," said Mr. Moore. "The people are given 10 days in which to invoke the referendum on a measure. In this case they did not do so within the specified time and it is plain that the election was illegal and void."

"The ordinance closing all places of amusement on Sunday, was approved by the mayor on February 11 and if the advocates of an open Sunday wanted to resort to the referendum they should have done so on or before February 21 in order to comply with the provisions of the initiative and referendum law. Instead they slept on their arms and filed no notice whatever with the recorder until March 6, after the ordinance had gone into effect. We maintain that it was palpably contrary to the law."

The mayor and council took the matter under advisement.

MUCH BUILDING PLAN IN TALENT

Little City is Forging Rapidly Ahead and Wiping Out Traces of Recent Fire—New School Will Cost Over 23,000.

Talent is rising like a Phoenix from its ashes, and the business section which was destroyed by fire is being rapidly rebuilt with larger and more substantial buildings.

Bids have just been let for the new school building. Snooks & Traver, the Salem contractors who are building the new school building at Ashland, were the successful bidders. The building is to be a two-story structure of cherry-red brick and pressed brick finish. It will cost \$23,175 and is to be one of the finest school buildings in the valley. It will have a basement and will be equipped with electric lights and all the modern conveniences.

The school will be located on the six-acre tract opposite Andrew Weidner's place. This site was purchased last spring and will be an ideal one for school purposes. The school will be built this summer.

The Odd Fellows are planning to put up a two-story concrete building 90x45 feet. The downstairs part will be used for store purposes, while the upstairs will be reserved for lodge purposes and business offices. It is to be located on the corner of Main and I streets and the plans have been submitted to the lodge, but have not yet been approved. It is expected that this new building, as well as the school, will be completed and ready for occupancy some time this summer.

J. C. Conway is building a shoe store near his residence on Main street. His former place of business was burned out.

J. F. Norman is making plans to erect a barber shop on I street across from the Bell house. It will be a frame building. Mr. Norman was also one of those who suffered in the fire.

The framework for the new Methodist church is now completed and work on the new building is progressing rapidly. For the present the congregation is holding meetings in Hanson hall, but the new structure will be finished in a few weeks.

MINING STOPS; COURTS ORDER

Temporary Injunction Issued by Calkins Restrains Oregon and Ontario Mining Company From Operations.

The Gold Ray Realty company, of which Colonel Ray is the head, has just filed an injunction against the Oregon & Ontario Mining company asking that they be restrained from mining on Rogue river between Gold Ray and Gold Hill.

The court issued a temporary injunction and the case will be tried Monday. The plaintiffs have given permission for the mining company to protect their work during the injunction.

The Oregon & Ontario Mining company claim that the Gold Ray people forfeited the claim in 1910 by insufficient work for assessment and consequently their "jumping" the claim was perfectly legal.

The mining company employs 50 men and at present is building a dam along their property.

The property is located near the old Astbury orchard, which Jack Morrill recently purchased. The claim was located in 1876 by the two Magruder brothers and J. W. Hayes. They held it and worked it up until five or six years ago when the Ray people purchased the half interest belonging to the Magruder brothers. Hayes and the Ray people worked it until February, 1910, when Ray bought out Mr. Hayes. In June, 1910, it was jumped by the Oregon & Ontario Mining company.

A. C. Hough of Grants Pass and J. L. Hammersley of Gold Hill represent the mining company, A. E. Reames the Ray people.
