

FRIENDS COME TO AID OF BOY

Local Boy Will Regain His Sight Through Efforts of Local Men—Harmon Interests Friends in Poor Boy's Case.

Through the efforts of Drs. Emmons and Conroy with the assistance of W. W. Harmon and T. E. Daniels, Patrick Crooxford will regain his sight and be an incumbent upon the county no longer.

The case is one of the saddest that has come under the attention of local people. Patrick Crooxford last summer was working in a hay field. At that time his eyes became filled with chaff.

Inflammation set in and soon the eyes were in a terrible condition. Doctors called on the lad, but gave him up. His funds ran out, so at the age of 28 the young boy, who was ambitious and proud, saw before him a life of blindness and a care on the county.

W. W. Harmon's attention was called to the lad's condition. He enlisted the aid of Drs. Conroy and Emmons, and T. E. Daniels took them to Ashland. Upon investigation Dr. Emmons thought that he could save one eye. He volunteered his services. For the past few days he has been devoting his time to the sufferer. The doctor hopes to save both eyes. Crooxford can see lights and shadows and can just distinguish the hazy outlines of faces.

Dr. Emmons has reduced the inflammation and is dilating the pupils of the eyes, which had become flattened by pain.

MANY TO LEARN FATE SATURDAY

Many Men, Found Guilty of Various Offenses This Past Week, Will Hear Sentence Pronounced Upon Them Tomorrow.

Saturday at 9 o'clock the circuit court will be called and adjourn after sentencing the following men, who were convicted during the last session of the court.

J. W. Canon, for assault with the attempt to rob.

Canon held up a trackwalker named Gudman, but relented when he perceived that his victim had but one hand. The attempted robbery took place at Siskiyou.

J. E. Nering will be sentenced for larceny of a dwelling. He and Canon stole guns, cartridges and knives from Gudman's home at Siskiyou. Nering pleaded guilty. Canon was freed of the charge, since he had a jail sentence over him at the time that the case was being tried.

W. E. Davies, who was convicted of larceny of an animal, will be sentenced.

The case of the state vs. John De Soto, alleged white slaver, will be continued over until the May session because of the sickness or absence of some of the witnesses. De Soto will be the lone occupant of the Jacksonville jail.
