

TRAIN SERVICE TO BUTTE FALLS

Passenger Service Instituted When Train Pulled Out Yesterday Afternoon—Chief Engineer Makes the Trip.

Regular passenger service between Medford and Butte Falls was instituted on the Pacific & Eastern Saturday afternoon when the train started at 3:45 p. m. with engineer Clay Cole and C. A. Bacon, conductor in charge of the train.

On the train were, William Gerig, chief engineer, A. F. Boltz, superintendent of construction, H. D. Mills, manager of the Butte Falls Lumber company and Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Carnahan. Mr. Carnahan is superintendent of the Blue Ledge mine.

Brom Butte Falls the road has been surveyed to the Narrows in Klamath county, head of lower Klamath lake, a distance of 51 miles. From there, striking due east some eight miles a connection with the Oregon Trunk can be secured.

The highest point in crossing over the mountains is near Fish lake, an elevation of 5300 feet being crossed.

The route from Butte Falls, lies along Willow creek. Thence up Little Butter Past Fish lake, crossing a meadow at that point and strikes near the lake of the woods. Up four mile creek and pass Pelican bay. Down Short creek and then due east to the Narrows.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 1.—Governor Johnson signed today the \$50,000 appropriation bill for the Panama-California exposition in 1915 at San Diego. The bill was signed with a gold tipped ostrich quill pen from an ostrich farm near San Diego and the ink used was taken from a huge silver topped crystal ink well presented by the citizens of San Diego.

North's Fate in Balance.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—The department of justice reported today to Secretary Nagel upon the case against Hart H. North, immigration commissioner at San Francisco, who was suspended some time ago. The report confirms in part charges made against North by Inspector Aainsworth.

LONDON, April 1.—For the first time in the history of the kingdom the revenues of the Great Britain passed the billion dollar mark during the year ending March 31. The figures made public today give \$1,009,252,840 as the total which is \$28,033,820 in excess of the expenditures.

CONVICTS TO BUILD ROAD TO FAIR GROUNDS

SALEM, Or., April 1.—The business men of this city have been invited by Governor West to a meeting to talk over the matter of bringing to completion the plans for a boulevard from the business district of the city to the state fair grounds with the aid of convict labor. The Salem board of trade and Business Men's league took this matter up a year ago, but on account of opposition, work on the highway was postponed. Governor West is anxious that the boulevard be completed before this year's state fair, and is willing to place convicts at the disposal of the city in order to hurry the work along.

RACES CALLED OFF AS RESULT OF ACCIDENT

STOCKTON, Cal., April 1.—As a result of the tragedy at the Stockton race track late yesterday in which C. H. Land lost his life, the motor cycle races between Stockton and Sacramento, scheduled for tomorrow have been called off.

The latest theory is that Land was victim of heart failure and that he died before he struck the tree. He had been speeding around the track for the race. Tracks show that he made a straight line for the tree, never veering from his course for a distance of more than 100 feet.

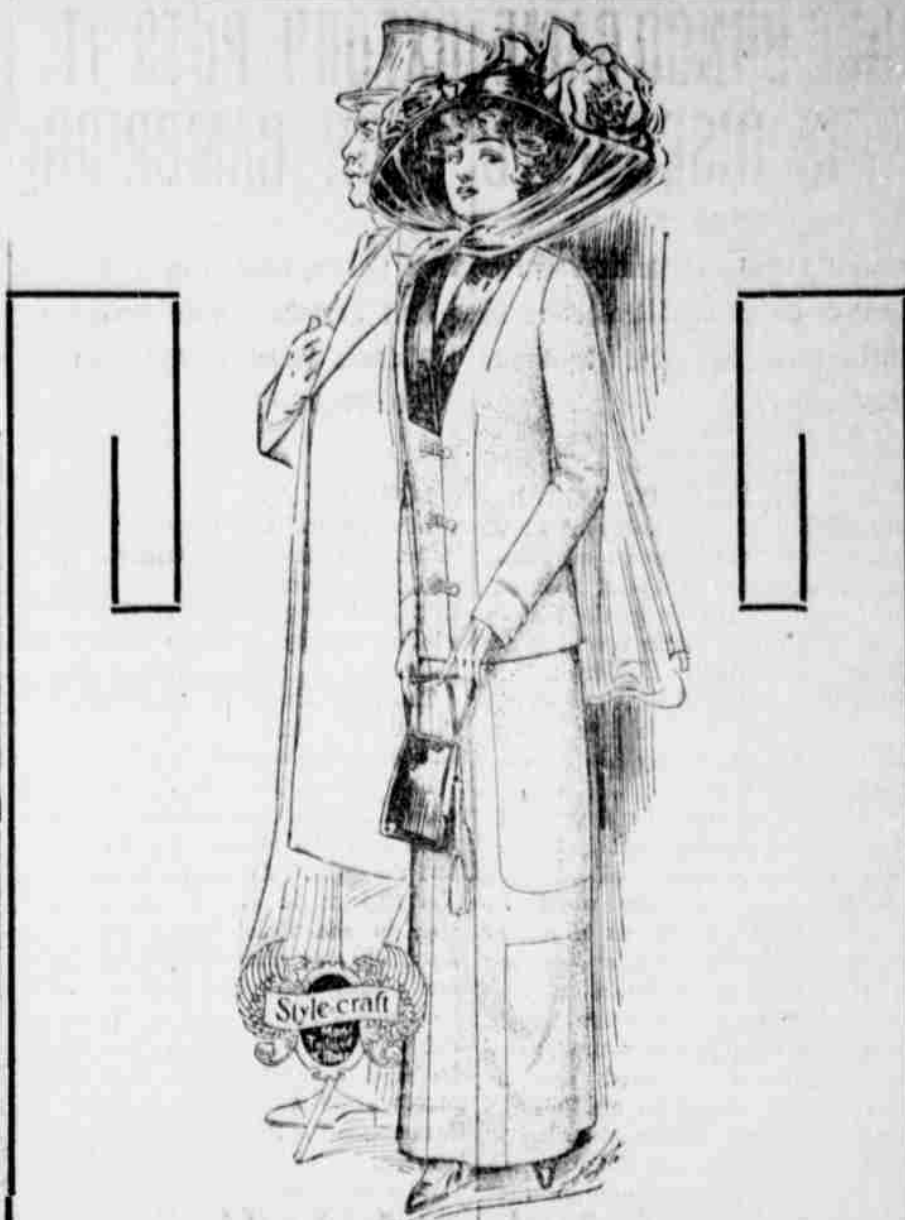
