In the ninth the locals did their best to score but McCoy after two runners got on bases struck out the players.

The indomitable Wilkenson fanned twice and the crowd was delirious with joy.

The Medford team could do little with McCoy's pitching, while both Burgess and Wick were badly hammered. But at the time Burgess was taken out of the box he had settled down and was pitching strike-out ball. If he had stayed the score perhaps would have been the other way, as it then stood 6-4 in favor of Medford.

The shortstop on the Crater Lakes was weak, and four runs were responsible for his errors. The lad, though had been sick and was then unable to stoop to the ground. The Crater Lakes did not kill the ball, but they certainly hit at the right times and placed the ball.

The two teams will meet two weeks from Sunday, as Medford plays Grants Pass next Sunday.

It was a good game yesterday and also, considering that the Crater Lakes had never played together before, it was a great win.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 3.—In search of his two children, who were awarded him by Judge Hawkins of Seattle after the divorce which separated him and his wife, Albert A. Henry, a clerk in the Seattle National Bank, arrived here today and sought aid in his quest from the local police.

Henry claims that a document is on foot to hurry his children from the states into Mexico. His attorney claims that the children are in the care of a nurse named Miss Wickoff.

The trouble which disrupted the Henry household followed a scandal involving Foster Kelly, secretary of the institution by which Henry is employed. The affair was the recent sensation of Seattle.

### GOVERNOR WEST TO PLAY BALL

PORTLAND, Ore., April 3.—Governor West in his younger days was one of the crack pitchers of Astoria, Salem and other Oregon towns, and has accepted the invitation of George S. Shepherd, secretary of the Portland baseball club, to pitch the first ball across the plate in the opening ceremonies April 18.

### Bath Tub Trust in Bad.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 3.—The government prosecutors today are concluding the preliminary work in the approaching prosecution of 34 individuals and 14 corporations, comprising the "bath tub" trust. It was predicted that court proceedings would be under way next week. All the defendants will be called to answer indictments, no promise of immunity having been made by the department of justice officials.

Beck, who was engaged in divorce proceedings with her, Mrs. Beck shot herself last night and today is dead in the emergency hospital. A policeman to whom Beck appealed when he got the death threat, arrived just as Mrs. Beck fired the fatal shot.

### Gates Wants Divorce.

NEW YORK, April 3.—Charles W. Gates, son of "Bet a Million" John W. Gates, is a defendant here today in a suit for divorce brought by his wife, Mrs. Mary W. Gates. Gates was married thirteen years ago in St. Louis. The couple have no children. There is only one ground upon which a suit for absolute divorce can be brought in this state, that is, for a statutory offense.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 3.—Aviator Charles E. Willard will leave tonight for Salt Lake City to meet representatives of a new commercial organization and arrange for a 2,000 mile cross country flight. It is said the route will be from New York to Denver in easy stages.

Receipts During March Breaks All Records — Sheriff Collected Over \$100,000 in Taxes—Recorder and Clerk Busy.

More business was transacted in the county offices during the month just closed than during any previous months since Jackson county has had his hands full, and receipts run large.

In the sheriff's office payment of taxes kept Sheriff Jones and a large force of clerks on the jump. During the month \$105,051.22 was collected.

The month was a busy one in the Recorder's office, in all 619 instruments were recorded during the month.

The recorder took in 677.33 for fees and \$66 for registration of titles.
