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FIXING STREET THROUGH PARK

Street Commissioner Baker Starts Crew Fixing Roadway Through City Park—To Put Curbs in On Each Side and Build Road.

Street Commissioner Baker started a gang of men on Tuesday morning to fix Ivy street for the block which runs through the park.

The street will be narrowed to a 20-foot roadway and cement curbs line both sides of the street. The street will be built of granite sand and this will be rolled by the city's steam roller.

This process will make it as hard and permanent as pavement.

The rest of the street will be rolled and seeded to lawn with flowers to line the street.

This will make a beautiful driveway through the park and improve the looks of the park 100 per cent.

He called upon the chaplain for prayer, the first prayer of a session which always is printed in the congressional record.

McDowell directed the reading of President Taft's proclamation calling the special session. Then the roll was called alphabetically by states to record the names of the members present.

Word passed among the members that 127 substitute names for those of members present at the session that opened last December appeared on the roll.

They came the great event of the day, the election of the speaker. Of course, the result was not in doubt but the realization that in a few minutes they would see Champ Clark's great form passing up the marble steps to the Speaker's station loomed and his 16 years' experience should stand him in good stead at this time.

McDowell named a democrat and a republican as tellers and they took their places at the clerk's desk. Each member, as his name was called, announced the name of his choice for speaker.

The democrats piled up their majority for Clark and a roar of approval rumbled through the long corridors of the capitol.

A committee was appointed to notify the Missouri leader of the honor given him. The committee accomplished the task in a few minutes and when they returned the new speaker smiling and happy, was greeted with another burst of applause.

Clark made a speech expressing his deep appreciation of the honor and his realization of the responsibility devolving upon him. He took his

oath of office and proceeded in turn to administer it to the members. They were called in groups to the clear space between the seats and the clerk's desk and with upraised hands subscribed to the oath as pronounced by the speaker.
