

## WHAT THE ROAD MEANS TO FALLS

First Train Greeted With Bon Fires and Great Cheering—Trip is Made Throughout Without Incident—Road Bed Being Repaired.

**BUTTE FALLS, Or., April 2.**—An event of great importance and general interest was the arrival of the first passenger train from Medford to Butte Falls on Saturday, the first day of April. This has been a long and anxiously awaited event and when the train reached our town about 9 p. m. of Saturday it was greeted by blazing confires, firing of guns, cheering of many voices and an enthusiastic throng of people, who warmly welcomed the arrival of the initial train. There were about 20 passengers aboard besides a good load of local freight, and household goods of the strangers coming to reside among us. The trip from Eagle Point was made without accident, or serious drawbacks, under the careful management of the train crew. The roadbed is being rapidly put in order and within a short time it will be a most delightful pleasure trip for our valley friends, and we anticipate a large influx of visitors and settlers from the present on, and that our town will take on much more of bordering on civilization and general interests will be very much advanced.

We will, for the present, have one train from Butte Falls each day and will be enabled to leave here at 7 a. m., reaching Medford at 10 a. m., and can return at 6:45 p. m., giving ample time to make daily trip and attend to business and reach home the same day. We feel that we are no longer isolated from environments calculated to introduce moral sentiments and bring us into close business relations with the outside world. None but those who have lived in this section and experienced the disadvantages of our isolation and our being deprived of communication and the inconveniences we have suffered therefrom can have the faintest idea of the extreme deprivations this community and section has undergone for years, and it is with gladness that we hear the snort of the iron horse, the rumbling of the cars and see the well filled coaches as they arrive in town.

Too much praise cannot be given Manager Gerig for the earnest diligence which he has shown to bring his steed to this point, and the active and continuous efforts of the officers and men who have worked with him in accomplishing a feat that will long stand out in the history of Jackson county, and particularly the Butte Falls section, as one of no little moment. Sunday, April 9, there will be a grand excursion which, we think and expect, will bring many Medford and valley people to our town.

There is room here for every kind of business, but there must be more of a spirit of encouragement and push given to the establishment of these enterprises and less of a selfish, grasping disposition shown to any effort made for the upbuilding and improvement of our community and we must take broad, hopeful views of the future.

The time has now come for Butte Falls to take on city airs and to banish all influences and suppress all tendencies which are likely to be hurtful to the progress and growth of the community and impress the outside world that we are something more than a "mill" town and that our ideas and sentiments are such as invite people of standing and influence to come and make their homes and follow their businesses with the promise that they will meet with such welcome and find such surroundings as conduce to the well raising of a family and the enjoyment of a peaceful, healthful section, where the most refreshing waters are abundant, the fishing good, the air delightful and the days not sweetly warm and the nights bring sweet repose to tired nature. It is now fit that "incorporation" should come; that peace, law and order be introduced and every inducement given to sojourn among us, for it will be but a few short years before Butte Falls will be among the most thriving towns in Jackson county. Let us all pull together and strive to redeem the past.

## WANT ROAD TO KLAMATH FALLS

Great Benefits Would Accrue to This Part of State if Good Commercial Thoroughfare Were Maintained Across the Mountains.

A movement is on foot, supported by the Ashland Commercial club and by all residents on the old stage road between Ashland and Klamath Falls, to improve the road this summer and make of it a first-class thoroughfare between the Rogue River valley and central Oregon. The matter will be brought before the Commercial club by C. W. DeCarlow, representing the residents on the road, and assurances are given that favorable action will be taken. The county will be asked for an appropriation of \$5000.

Those who are agitating in favor of the appropriation for the improvement declare that it will be a great advantage to this country and particularly to Ashland, for the reason that it will be the main, and in fact the only improved road from here to the Klamath country. For some time little or nothing has been done to maintain the road in good condition. It has been fairly good in the summer, but during the winter months all travel out of that country has been almost impossible.

It is pointed out that the maintenance of the road in good condition the year round will bring a great deal of tourist travel into the Rogue River valley. At present motorists prefer to travel from northern California into the Klamath country and from there north through central Oregon but it is said that with a good thoroughfare across the Cascade range hundreds of tourists would be brought into the Rogue River valley every year.

One-half of the Shake road lies in Klamath county and this has already been improved. It is estimated that \$5000, if appropriated by Jackson county, will bring the portion of the road lying in this county to good repair.
