DOESN'T PAY WIFE; UP FOR CONTEMPT

Judge Calkins Summons Tom Robertson to Learn Why He Doesn't Pay His Wife Alimony Recently Ordered—Must Pay or Go to Jail.

Tom Robertson was cited for contempt of court Tuesday morning in the circuit court by Judge Calkins for not paying alimony to his wife, Jessie Robertson and was ordered to pay it or go to jail.

Mrs. Robertson was granted a decree last fall and Robertson ordered to pay \$20 per month alimony. This he failed to do and furthermore is said to have refused to pay it.

Attorney Withington took action in the circuit court on Tuesday for Mrs. Robertson who is the step daughter of John Harrington.

Judge Calkins has decided that failure to pay alimony must cease and all offenders will be dealt with summarily.

He gave Robertson a few days to pay the money, the amount due being determined then.

IF WEATHER CLEARS FROST TO COME

Orchardists Should Be Prepared to Smudge if Clouds Clear Away, States Professor P. J. O'Gara—Warning is Issued.

"A orchardists and fruitgrowers should be prepared for a heavy frost as soon as the weather clears," predicts Professor O'Gara.

"The snow is very low and the air chilled. It is times like these that heavy frosts occur and if the orchardists will prepare for smudging and call up the telephone central at 6:30 every evening they will be warned of frosts in due time and if the materials for smudging are ready there will be no loss of fruit."

"I wish every orchardist would purchase a maximum and a minimum thermometer and also take the rainfall. The resulting information would be valuable to this office and greatly assist the work."

A few fine sulphur bullets are on hand at Professor O'Gara's office and as they are in great demand those who need them would do well to order soon.

The spray calendar will be ready for the orchardist about Tuesday. They can be procured at the office of Professor O'Gara or the inspectors.
