A bridge across Rogue river on the road out from Eagle Point near the George Jackson ranch will also be ordered, the court having accepted the viewers' report.

A representative delegation from Eagle Point and upper Sams Valley called on the court and urged the court to give favorable action.

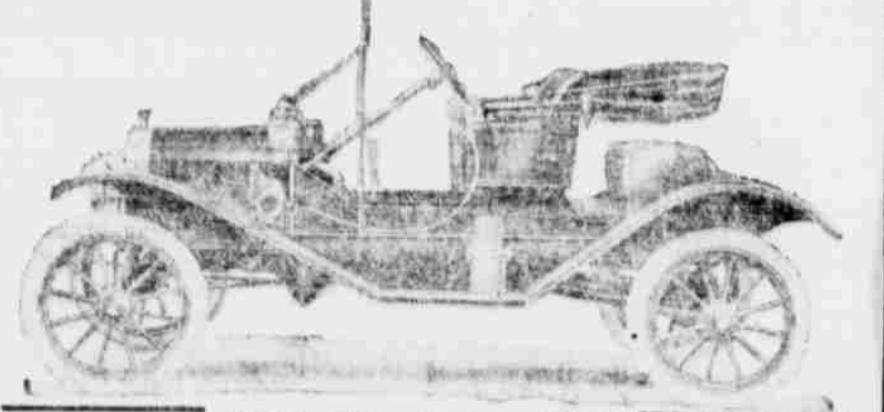
