ROSEBURG PLANS BERRY FESTIVAL

Third Annual Event to Be the Greatest; Strawberry Eating Contests Will Be Held Along With Several Other Stunts.

Roseburg is preparing to hold its third annual strawberry festival. It is to be the greatest carnival or street fair ever held in Oregon, according to letters received by the Commercial club this morning from R. E. Smith of that city.

The people have signified their intention to contribute liberally to the fund and several thousand dollars will be raised to be used in engaging bands, decorating, prizes for the various contests, etc.

The festival will begin May 11 and continue for three days. Among the features will be strawberry eating contests, a complete list of outdoor sports, the winding of the May pole, greased pig race, tug of war, in fact an interesting event will take place every hour of the day and half the night, until Saturday, when the festival will wind up in a blaze of glory.

There will be probably between 500 and 1000 crates of strawberries on display at all times during the festival. There will also be a rose show with more than 1000 varieties on exhibition. During the past year more than 100,000 new rose plants were set out in Roseburg, according to Mr. Smith, one man having imported directly from England and France nearly 1000 bushes for his personal planting.
