APPLE MARKET REPORTED STRONG

Very Heavy Inquiry and Light Offering is Cause—Exchange Considers Storage of Fruit at Shipping Point—Banner Sale Made.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange in a recent bulletin says:

The apple market continues exceedingly strong, under a very heavy inquiry and very light offerings.

The exchange has just made a sale which perhaps will stand as the "record sale" of the northwest for the apple season of 1910-11.

Car G. N. 91960 from Sherman Spur, Wash., March 26, containing 600 boxes extra fancy Winesaps, sizes as follows: Seven 3 1/2 tier, 128 4-tier, 306 4 1/2 tier and 249 5-tier sold at a straight price of \$2.40 per box, Enoch Sherman Spur, Wash., to a buyer in Central Texas. This sale is all the more remarkable inasmuch as the car contained 249 boxes of five tier apples. In order to insure good delivery we have required the purchaser to have the car loaded at Minneapolis, and kept fully iced to destination, inasmuch as the weather in the southern states is now getting very warm.

The exchange has been giving considerable thought to the question of storage at shipping point. It has been demonstrated this year that fruit which could be carried at shipping point in good condition, and freshly packed would bring considerably higher prices than the same grade of fruit in cold storage in the east or middle west. The exchange is under the impression that dry storage or air storage is even better than cold storage at this end of the line provided storages are built with special reference to carrying fruit. The fruit should be held in field crates and freshly packed immediately prior to shipment. In this way good delivery can be effected, and the fruit is much less liable to deterioration than if taken from storage and subjected to a much higher temperature.

\$300,000 FOR TELEPHONE LINES

Home Telephone Company Plans to Expend Much Money in Extension of System—Toll Lines to Be Built to All Valley Points.

The Home Telephone company which early in January temporarily stopped construction work until the winter was over has made a contract with the Interstate Finance Construction company of San Francisco to build its extensions not only to the outlying districts of Medford including the east side but also toll lines between Ashland and Grants Pass and to all other points in the valley. It has a contract to use the poles of the Postal Telegraph company. Its superior toll service is to be a special feature of the company.

The Home Telephone company now has about 700 contracts for phones in Medford and by fall expects to have more than one thousand installed.

The work is to be first class in every respect. On the east side of Bear creek the wires on Main street are to be placed underground. The company has already expended \$100,000 and before the valley system is complete over \$300,000 additional will have been spent. As in the past it will be a special point with the company to buy all material possible from our Medford merchants.

William B. Reis, a capitalist of San Francisco, has very heavily invested in the telephone company and there are associated with him a number of influential and wealthy men of the neighboring state to the south.
