

COLONEL ALLEN'S KLAMATH HOME

Ideal Resort Found, Declares Retired Army Official Who Has Established a Lodge on the Great Lake Where He Enjoys Life.

The Klamath Falls Chronicle contains the following regarding the arrival there of Colonel L. C. Allen, father of A. C. Allen of Medford, who has spent the winter here with his son at the latter's orchard:

Colonel Allen is one of those men who served his country until it was time for him to retire and join the ranks of those who seek enjoyment in life for the rest of their days, and after spending several years looking for a suitable place where he could enjoy nature in all her grandeur, he settled on the great lake and declares this the greatest place on earth for the man who is seeking quiet, and at the same time a place where he can enjoy life just as the true sportsman would have it.

The colonel is a sportsman of the first water. He came to Klamath Falls about two years ago, and after spending some time in the city and surrounding country he purchased a tract of land on the west side of the lake, where he immediately established a summer home. He christened his place Wildwood, and in addition to erecting a comfortable abode on the bank of the lake, he at once began preparations to enjoy cruises over the great lake in motor power crafts. He owns a launch, several rowboats, and one of the finest boat houses on those waters.

Colonel Allen declares there is no place on the globe where a man can secure a home closer to nature and where he can get all of the sport to be found. He remains at his home on the west shores of the lake, opposite back island, clear away from any other inhabitant, a great deal of the time cultivating a small garden patch, and at any time he wishes can step out and get a fine trout from the shores of his home. When the roving spirit attacks him, he goes out in his houseboat or launch, and strikes camp at some other point, and during the hunting season is able to get all the ducks and geese he wishes. In addition to this, he can rattle back over the hill from his home and get a buck most any time when these are allowed to be slain under the law, and some times a bear can be bagged not far from his home.

BUYS INTEREST IN GLEN ROGUE

Eastern Paint Man Invests in Local Orchard—Is Charmed With Valley—Will Make His Home On the Property.

William L. Davies, president of the Acme White Lead and Color works of Detroit, has purchased an interest in the Glen Rogue orchard, two miles west of Jacksonville. The consideration is said to run well up into the thousands.

The Glen Rogue orchard contains 1408 acres of growing trees, and of the 7000 yearlings set out 60 per cent are Bartlett's, 30 per cent D'Anjou's, and 10 per cent Winter Neils.

Yes I am enthusiastic over the future of this valley and I am glad I bought here."
