MUST PAY OWN
FARE TO FRISCO

Congress Fails to Provide Funds for
Commission to Visit Coast City and
Choose Site for 1915 Panama
Exposition.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 8.—Because of the failure of congress to provide funds for the transportation of the United States fine arts commission to San Francisco, the selection of the site for the Panama-Pacific exposition will be further deferred.

President Taft announced recently that Attorney General Wickersham had informed him that, owing to the present condition of the finances the commission must go to San Francisco as individuals and not as officials. As a result the commissioners are not likely to look over the available sites until the latter part of April and the announcement of the site selected probably will not be made until late in May.

WANTS INFORMATION IN
REGARD TO COAL STRIKE

OTTAWA, Ont., April 8.—Major Perron, member from MacLeod district, today introduced a resolution in the house of commons inquiring if the government had any information to communicate in regard to the strike of coal miners in Alberta and British Columbia.

MacKenzie King, on behalf of the government, replied that an agent of the department, who was on the ground, had ascertained that the miners' international executive, with headquarters at Indianapolis, was considering the strike and that there was a prospect of the executive taking action which might end it summarily.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 8.—Frank C. Avery, indicted in Kansas on a charge of having used the mails to promote a fraudulent railroad scheme in which former United States Senator Burton was interested, was held here today in the United States district court to answer before the district court of Kansas City at the May term. Bonds of \$10,000 were furnished.
