

WILL SURVEY CRATER FOREST

Forestry Service Plans to Make Careful Survey of Timber in Local Forest—Will Be Classified for Future Reference.

The local office of the forest service is preparing for a heavy season's work for 1911. Supervisor M. L. Erickson has just returned from Portland where he went for instructions as to this season's work.

"This summer beginning May 1," says Mr. Erickson, "we are going to make a thorough and complete reconnaissance of the east slope of the Cascade in the Crater National Forest."

"The idea of this work is to determine by actual estimate the total amount of standing timber, separating it into the different species the stand classifications, the types, grazing, burns, and all other possible classifications of the forest and topography."

"Detailed topographical maps with a scale of four inches to the mile will be made, showing the topography by fifty feet contours."

"After such an examination and maps are prepared this office will be able to know the quantity and kind of timber on every water shed."

"The best and cheapest manner of logging it will be determined and also the best market to get it out to market."

"This work will be the bases for all timber sales and determined all future management of the forest."

"The party which is to do the work will be under E. A. Baniff, who is one of our most efficient and experienced men in this work. The party will consist of sixteen men."

"Already about one fourth of this area, east of the Cascade has been covered by such a survey by the local force in the field."

"Such a reconnaissance as this, and on such a scale has never before been carried on in any forest in Oregon."

MANY COMING SAYS OLWELL

"Capital is as eager to invest in Rogue River as they ever were, and you will see the development of this long before harvest. The most healthy condition, outside of this assurance, that I could see is the great interest shown by people of lesser means, who want to come here and settle on the lands, and go into small orcharding, and side cropping. I am glad to learn that many land owners are beginning to recognize the value of that class of citizens, and are subdividing to take care of them. We want all kinds of capital, and I am sure it is coming in 1911."

NEW SCHOOL IS TO BE ERECTED

Building is to Be Placed on Grape Street to House a Commercial and Normal School—Work Will Start in Near Future.

There will be erected this spring on Grape near Main street a two story brick building to be known as College Building and used exclusively by Medford Business College.

The site was sold yesterday to J. B. Andrews and Culpepper and Townsend. The building to be erected will cost \$18,000.

The owners and promoters of the new institution have had many years experience in business colleges, normal school and public school work.

They will conduct both day and evening classes in business and academic subjects. M. I. Townsend of Mission High School, San Francisco, California will be principal of the new institution and will teach the normal school subjects. J. M. Culpepper, formerly of Merrill-Miller and Metropolitan Business Colleges of San Francisco will be manager of Medford Business College and will instruct in the Commercial department.

Miss Inna Anderson of Metropolitan Business College, San Francisco will take charge of the stenographic and typewriting courses.

Mr. Culpepper said: "Business has the right of way in Medford, and your demands for well trained young men and women require an institution of more than ordinary merit."
