

RANCHERS ASK FOR PROTECTION

Managers of Cudahy Ranch Near International Boundary Say That Maudering Bands Have Commanded Every Horse on the Ranch.

CALEXICO, Cal., April 8.—Following a race with a band of mounted rebels under Captain Stanley to the international boundary, managers of the Cudahy ranch in Lower California appealed today to Captain Babcock, U. S. A., for protection.

The ranch proprietors assert that marauding bands had commandeered every horse and mule on the Cudahy ranch. Captain Stanley wanted the automobile, they said, and chased them to the border, firing several shots at them when it was apparent they would escape. Non-combatants were ordered out of Mexico again today. A band of 500 federal soldiers who camped last night five miles west of Calexico were expected to attack within 24 hours.

PASSENGERS ARE ALL TAKEN SAFELY OFF WRECKED SHIP

NEW YORK, April 8.—All of the passengers of the North German Lloyd liner Princess Irene, which is ashore off Fire Island, were safely landed early today by the Steamer Prinz Friedrich Wilhelm. All joined in praise for the Irene's crew.

The liner position today is most grave. Her entire length is buried in the sand and if a blow comes up she will almost surely be pounded to pieces.

STILL FIGHTING FOR MILLIONS

Baldwin Contest Will Be Carried to Supreme Court—First Steps in an Appeal Taken—Formal Notice Soon to Be Filed.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 8.—The lengthy battle waged in the superior court recently by Beatrice Anita Turnbull Baldwin for a portion of the estate of "Lucky" Baldwin, which resulted in an adverse verdict for her, will be resumed in the supreme court of California.

The first steps in an appeal were taken today, when notice was served upon County Clerk Leland to prepare a transcript of the proceedings in the lower court.

Formal notice of appeal will be filed within a few days. The ground will be that of erroneous instructions to the jury.

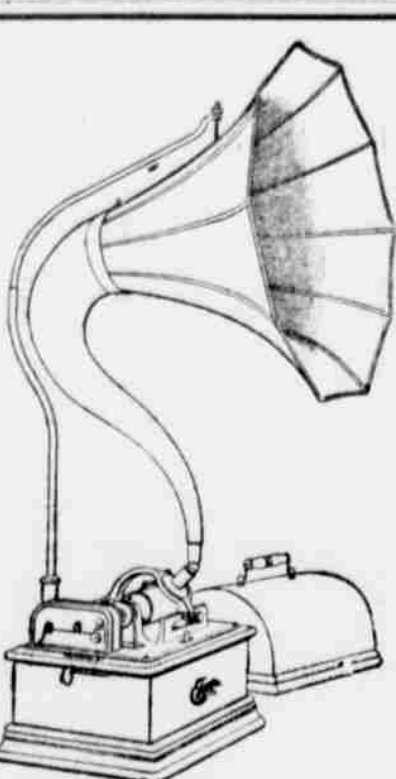
