COUNTY TO BUILD TWO NEW BRIDGES

Contracts Are Let to Columbia Bridge Company—One to Go on Upper Rogue And One Near Upper Sams Valley.

The county court has accepted the plans for the Big Butte bridge near Derby and the Upper Sams Valley bridge across the Rogue river and contracts were let to the Columbia Bridge Company for \$8,000 and \$12,000 respectively.

The Sams Valley bridge will have concrete piers and have a 220 foot span with long approaches. The Big Butte bridge will also have concrete piers and will be of the steel highway type. The span will be 200 feet in length. It is located some ten miles from Derby and crosses Big Butte at the mouth of the creek.

Both bridges are to be built under the supervision of W. W. Harmon, county head engineer.

The county court let the contract to the Columbia people without advertising for bids as they desired quick work in order to secure the subsidy of \$6,000 promised by Col. Ray for the immediate constitution of the bridges.

CABLE INJURES CEMENT WORKER

Foreman at Cement Factory is Struck By Cable and Injured— Suffers Painful Injury But No Fracture— Escape Narrow.

J. H. Henley was severely hurt by a cable striking him at the Medford cement factory, about 10 o'clock Saturday morning. Wes Green took the injured man to the Southern Oregon Hospital.

Henley, who is the foreman for the cement works, was helping on some work at the screening plant. He stepped near a cable that is used to pull the drag scraper back into Bear Creek. The cable was not in motion then, and as J. F. Watson, who runs it could not see Henley from his position, started up the motor and the cable tightened and sprung some thirty feet into the air, whiplashed down and caught Henley on the right leg at the knee.

The bruise is severe but it was a miracle he was not killed or lost a limb if the cable had hit him fairly instead of a glancing blow it would have done so.

LABORER FALLS; FATALLY HURT

Greek at Work on New Hotel Building Falls—No Hope for His Recovery—Suffered Compound Fracture of the Skull.

Christ Pulmumbis, a Greek laborer, had his head crushed Saturday afternoon while working on the new Medford hotel. Dr. Porter, who is in attendance, holds out no hopes for his recovery. Pulmumbis was working on a ladder, when it slipped. He fell 35 feet to the basement.

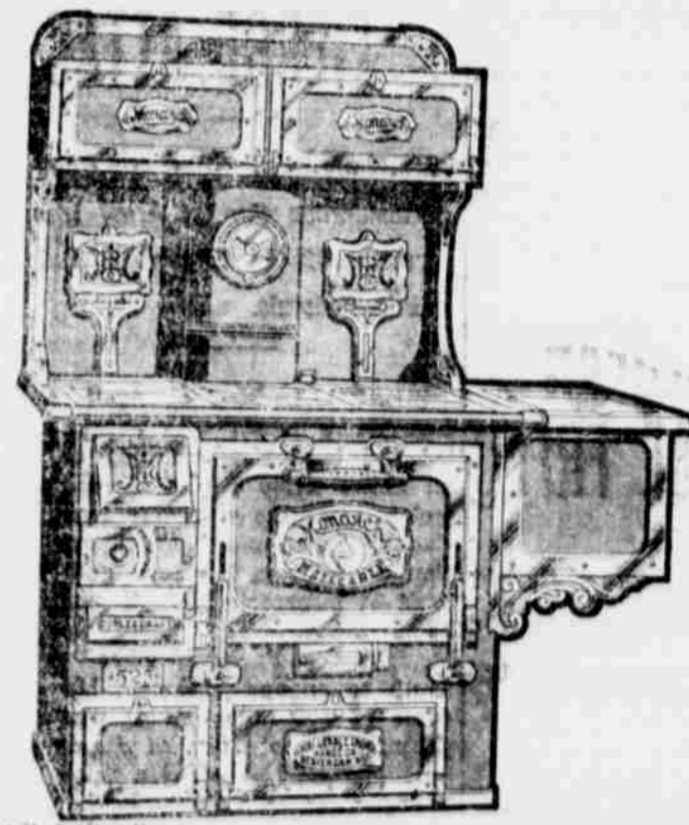
